BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that said Committee be authorized to expend the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for necessary clerical hire required for the taking of testimony and keeping the record thereof.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE TERRITORY OF ALASKA:

Whereas an effort seems to be made throughout the nation to celebrate the 6th day of April as a national anniversary of the entry of the United States into the World War and to be known as National Army Day.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Governor is requested to call upon the people of the Territory of Alaska to celebrate the day by displaying the National Flag at their homes and places of business, in event he shall find such celebration of the 6th day of April in harmony with the general attitude of the rest of the country on the subject.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE TERRITORY OF ALASKA:

WHEREAS, the Interdepartmental Committee functioning in the Territory of Alaska, and consisting of representatives of the United States Departments of Agriculture, Commerce and Interior, has recently announced the policy of using

materials produced in Alaska whenever possible in all public works and activities, and:

WHEREAS, certain public works wherein large numbers of unskilled laborers are employed, are let out on contracts in which contractors from the States are in most cases the successful bidders, and:

WHEREAS, it has been brought to the attention of this Legislature that unskilled labor, of which there is a plentiful supply in Alaska, is being brought into the Territory by said contractors;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is the sense of this Legislature that the rule adopted by the Interdepartmental Committee as to materials, as above stated, be extended to include the working men of the Territory of Alaska likewise, and, that all contracts concerning public work on roads, buildings and otherwise, to be performed in this Territory, should stipulate that Alaskan labor be utilized whenever possible.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this Resolution be sent to the following: The President of the United States, the Secretary of the Interior, the Secretary of Agriculture, the Secretary of Commerce, to the Hon. James Wickersham, Delegate from Alaska, to the Hon. George A. Parks, Governor of Alaska, and member of the Interdepartmental Committee representing the Interior Department, to the Hon. Charles Flory, member of the Interdepartmental Committee representing the Dept. of Agriculture, and to the Hon. Dennis Winn, member of the Interdepartmental Committee representing the Department of Commerce.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6.
