SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring, that a joint executive session of the Senate and House of Representatives of the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska be held in the hall of the House of Representatives at the Capitol at Juneau, Alaska, at the hour of 2 o'clock in the afternoon of Wednesday, April 8th, 1931, for the purpose of acting upon the nominations sent in by Governor Geo. A. Parks as members of the Board of Trustees of the Alaska Agricultural College and School of Mines and the Territorial Commissioner of Health.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 4.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring, that:

WHEREAS, the people of Alaska, believing in that great American maxim "In education lies the strength of our Republic," realize that in this age the necessity of giving every child in the Territory equal opportunity to obtain an education is paramount, and since the beginning of our local government have spent a large portion of our revenue for the maintenance of our public school system, and

WHEREAS, in a Territory having such magnificent distances as ours it is manifestly impossible to maintain High Schools, except in the larger centers of population, thus offering all of our children an equal opportunity to advance sufficiently in their studies to enable them to enter our Alaska College or other Temples of Higher Education, and

WHEREAS, this condition destroys the childrens incentive as it offers no opportunity for future development and fails to

prepare our future citizens to cope with and take hold of our industrial life, and

WHEREAS, this has caused many families to leave the Territory in order to enable their children to secure greater learning, thereby losing to our Territory the best type of growing citizens who would otherwise become real Alaskans, now therefor [therefore]

BE IT RESOLVED that this Legislature instruct the Commissioner of Education to make a survey of conditions with the view of establishing regional High Schools at Nome and other parts of our vast Territory and also to determine the most feasible manner of having all high schools accredited by the Universities of the Pacific Northwest, thereby enabling children from our isolated areas to secure the necessary education so vital to their progress within reasonable distances from their own localities, and that the Commissioner of Education make a report of his findings and recommendation to the Territorial Board of Education for action as soon as possible.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 5.

WHEREAS, the daily journal of the Senate and House for April 30th has not been read or approved, and as the validity of all measures passed by the Legislature on that date depends upon the correct journal entries being made at each stage of their consideration;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate and House concurring that the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House in conjunction with the Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the House, be authorized, after the close of the Session, to revise and arrange said journals in proper and correct order and sign same, and that said President of the Senate and Speaker of the House be allowed the same salary as they are now receiving, as members of the Legislature, for a period of time not to exceed ten days.
