

## SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE TERRITORY OF ALASKA:

WHEREAS the United States is the owner in fee of the premises in the Town of Sitka, Alaska, commonly known as the "Marine Barracks" upon which the Territory of Alaska for the past twenty years has maintained and conducted the "Pioneers' Home";

NOW THEREFORE, Be it resolved by the Territorial Senate, the Territorial House of Representatives concurring, that the Delegate to Congress of the United States, be, and he is hereby respectfully requested, to interview the respective authorities of the United States at the City of Washington, with the object in view of securing a transfer of said premises so that the legal title thereto may become vested in the Territory of Alaska.

## SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5.

WHEREAS, Carl Dunlap, a miner and pioneer resident of the Territory of Alaska, did, on or about February 1928, while engaged as a miner and prospector in the Chandelar Mining District, Alaska, sustain an injury, by an accidental explosion of dynamite, whereby he, the said Carl Dunlap was completely blinded in both eyes, and

WHEREAS, his blindness has proven to be permanent and total, and,

WHEREAS, the said Carl Dunlap on or about April 12, 1928 was admitted to and he became a member of the Pioneer Home at Sitka, Alaska but owing to the impossibility of obtaining such medical aid as it was believed would restore, or partially restore, his eyesight while remaining in said home, he did, on or about August 20, 1929, leave said home in search of medical aid, and,

WHEREAS, his search has proven to be in vain in that he remains permanently and totally blind, and,

WHEREAS, he is wholly without funds, except as the same are provided by his brother who is now caring for him and who has cared for him since he left the home of the Pioneers as above stated, and

WHEREAS, his actual needs, that is to say, board, room, clothing and personal care can be and the same are being provided far cheaper than the same can be provided at the Pioneer Home.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Trustees of the Pioneer Home of Alaska are hereby authorized to grant an allowance for his needs from the amount appropriated for aged residents of Alaska.

### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE TERRITORY OF ALASKA:

That the Committee of the House and of the Senate on Judiciary and Federal Relations, at and during the present session, be and they hereby are authorized to expend the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) each, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for necessary supplies and for the employment of additional clerical help.

The Treasurer is hereby authorized to pay the above mentioned sums upon warrants issued by the Auditor in accordance with law, said warrants to be issued upon vouchers approved by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House acting for the several Committees on Judiciary and Federal Relations of their respective Houses.

### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE TERRITORY OF ALASKA, That

WHEREAS, Approximately eighty-one percent of the revenues of the Territory of Alaska are derived from the fishing industries
