### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE TERRITORY OF ALASKA:

That the Committee of the House and of the Senate on Judiciary and Federal Relations, at and during the present session, be and they hereby are authorized to expend the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) each, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for necessary supplies and for the employment of additional clerical help.

The Treasurer is hereby authorized to pay the above mentioned sums upon warrants issued by the Auditor in accordance with law, said warrants to be issued upon vouchers approved by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House acting for the several Committees on Judiciary and Federal Relations of their respective Houses.

### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE TERRITORY OF ALASKA, That

WHEREAS, Approximately eighty-one percent of the revenues of the Territory of Alaska are derived from the fishing industries

and a large portion of the population, including more than five thousand natives, earn their living by fishing and accordingly they as well as the Territory are vitally interested in everything that pertains to the industry; and

WHEREAS, it has been the custom of the Bureau of Fisheries, who are in complete control of the industry to hold public meetings each year in Seattle but it has been impossible for the fishermen of Alaska to attend these meetings, because of the time required and also because of the expense which is beyond their means, and

WHEREAS, these fishermen are anxious to co-operate with the said Bureau of Fisheries and to attend such meetings whenever it is possible for them to do so and for this reason they desire such meetings to be held in the Territory at such times and places as would enable them to attend and to present their views; now

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, that they favor the holding of such meetings in Alaska, at such times and places as shall be designated by the Bureau of Fisheries and convenient to the fishermen, natives of Alaska and others interested; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the President of the United States, the Honorable Anthony J. Dimond, Delegate to Congress from Alaska and to the Honorable Frank T. Bell, United States Commissioner of Fisheries.

### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8.

WHEREAS a number of bills, resolutions and memorials have been submitted to this Session of the Legislature, having for their object or purpose the construction and/or establishment of greatly needed public improvements in this Territory; and

WHEREAS the revenues of the Territory have greatly decreased and it is becoming increasingly difficult to defray the cost of the territorial government and provide for the relief of persons rendered destitute by the general economic depression; and

WHEREAS this Territory has not the power to incur any indebtedness in excess of its current income;
