## CHAPTER 12.

### AN ACT

[S. B. 6]

To repeal all of Article III, Chapter 1, of the Compiled Laws of Alaska, 1933, Sections 520 to 527 inclusive, requiring persons operating airplanes to give security for ability to respond in damages to persons injured.

*Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:*

Section 1. That all of Article III, Chapter 1, of the Compiled Laws of Alaska, 1933, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

## CHAPTER 13.

### AN ACT

[S. B. 17]

Providing for the keeping of records by second-hand dealers and pawnbrokers, providing punishment for violations thereof, and repealing Sections 4851 and 4852 Compiled Laws of Alaska, 1933.

*Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:*

Second-hand  
dealers and  
pawnbrokers  
to keep  
records.

Section 1. Any person, firm or corporation, excepting banks, engaged in the business of buying and sell-

ing second-hand articles, or lending money thereon, shall maintain in his place of business a book, having ruled and fixed leaves, in permanent form, in which shall be legibly written, in English, at the time of each loan, purchase or sale:

- (a) The date of such transaction;
- (b) The name of the person, or employee, conducting the same;
- (c) The name, age and address of the person with whom the transaction is had; Defining what must be kept in records.
- (d) A description of the property bought or received in pledge, which shall, in the case of firearms, watches, cameras and optical goods, contain the name of the maker, the serial, model or other numbers, and all letters and marks inscribed thereon;
- (e) The price paid or amount loaned;
- (f) The signature of the person with whom the transaction was had subscribed thereto.

Such entries shall appear in chronological order, in ink or indelible pencil, without any blank lines being left between the entries; and no obliterations, alterations or erasures shall be made except that corrections may be made by drawing a line in ink through the erroneous entry or part thereof, in such a manner as not to destroy its legibility; and said book shall be used for no other purpose and shall at all reasonable times be open to the inspection of any marshal, deputy marshal or police officer. Defining how record must be kept.

Section 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of the preceding section, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars or by imprisonment for not exceeding six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Prescribing punishment.

Repeal.

Section 3. That Sections 4851 and 4852 Compiled Laws of Alaska, 1933, be and the same hereby are repealed.

## CHAPTER 14.

### AN ACT

[H. B. 56]

Authorizing and directing the Commissioner of Education to prepare a course of study on alcoholism and narcotics for the public schools of Alaska.

*Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:*

Commissioner of Education to prepare course of study on subject of alcoholism and narcotics for schools.

Section 1. That the Commissioner of Education is hereby authorized and directed to prepare a suitable, reliable and unbiased course of study on the subject of alcoholism and narcotics for the grades in which health and hygiene are usually taught in the elementary schools and for the science courses in high schools of Alaska.

Teachers to use course.

Section 2. Every teacher teaching in the public schools of the Territory of Alaska shall use such course of study on alcoholism and narcotics as is prepared by the Commissioner of Education, and other material which he may submit from time to time on the same subject.
