

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10.

TO THE WAR DEPARTMENT OF THE UNITED STATES AND THE UNITED STATES SIGNAL CORPS:

WHEREAS, The Nome radio telegraph station has been profitably operated and maintained from its inception, and

WHEREAS, even with the present improved mail service, letter communication entails serious delay, rendering imperative the use of the radio service for the transaction of the major part of the business, and

WHEREAS, we are convinced that the volume of traffic through the radio station could be greatly increased and stimulated by a lower rate thereby accelerating the the industrial and economic development of the Territory,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the War Department and U. S. Signal Corps be petitioned to grant us whatever reduction is compatible with the splendid service maintained, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be forwarded to Honorable A. J. Dimond, Delegate to Congress from Alaska.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE TERRITORY OF ALASKA:

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Sections 801, 802 and 803, Compiled Laws of Alaska 1933, the Board of Administration for the Territory of Alaska was created and its duties and powers prescribed; and

WHEREAS, during the last biennium this Board has functioned in a very satisfactory manner and it is the belief of the Legislature that the powers and duties of the Board could profitably be extended to cover a larger scope than at present;
