### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 1

WHEREAS The Honorable Alton G. Nordale of Fairbanks, Alaska, Representative from the Fourth Judicial Division of the Territory of Alaska in the eleventh and twelfth sessions of the Alaska Legislature, suddenly came to his death on August 19, 1935, in an airplane accident while traveling from Dawson to Fairbanks; and

WHEREAS Mr. Nordale was a man of outstanding personality and of pleasing character, a faithful and competent worker in the said eleventh and twelfth sessions of the Legislature, of which he was a member, and had the affection and esteem of all his fellow members;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the thirteenth session of the Alaska Legislature in joint session assembled, that we keenly feel the loss of our former member and deeply sympathize with his family in their great bereavement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED That this resolution be spread upon the Journals of the House and Senate, and that a copy of same be mailed to his widow Mrs. Katherine Nordale and to his mother Mrs. A. J. Nordale, both of Fairbanks, Alaska.

### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3

WHEREAS, the continued interest of the President of the United States in the welfare and development of Alaska and its people is earnestly desired as evidenced by Senate Concurrent Resolution Number Two in the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, Thirteenth Session, extending an invitation to the Hon-

orable Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States to visit our great Territory, and

WHEREAS, the first woman Representative to ever serve in an Alaska Legislature—Mrs. Nell Scott—desires and wishes that a special invitation be extended by the Legislature to Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt to visit Alaska, and

WHEREAS, being aware of the great interest Mrs. Roosevelt has taken in welfare work among the women of our country and the betterment of living standards following her efforts, the women of Alaska would consider it an honor and pleasure to have the opportunity to meet with Mrs. Roosevelt and do everything possible to make her trip one to be remembered.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, the Senate concurring, that it is the wish of the people of Alaska that a cordial invitation should be and the same is hereby respectfully tendered to Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt to visit Alaska.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Honorable John W. Troy, Governor of Alaska, be requested to forward a copy of this Resolution to Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt with a letter expressing the appreciation and friendship of the women of Alaska.
