NOW, THEREFORE, your Memorialist, the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, respectfully asks that the extension of the Federal Building, at Juneau, Alaska, be given consideration and the necessary steps be taken to make this improvement as quickly as the same can be done.

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## HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 48

TO THE HONORABLE A. J. DIMOND, DELEGATE TO CONGRESS FROM ALASKA:

Your Memorialist, the Legislature of Alaska, in regular session assembled, respectfully represents:

WHEREAS, House Joint Resolution No. 184, proposed by the Sixty-eighth Congress of the United States on June 4, 1924, would amend the Constitution of the United States and authorize Congress to limit, regulate and prohibit child labor, and

WHEREAS, said proposed amendment has been favorably acted upon by twenty-four States of the Union, and

WHEREAS, before said amendment becomes effective it is necessary that the same be approved by twelve additional States of the Union, and

WHEREAS, Alaska, while having no voice in amending the Constitution of the United States, favors the proposed amendment, which would permit Congress to enact liberal and humane

legislation to safeguard the health, education and future welfare of the youth of the Territory and Nation.

NOW, THEREFORE, your Memorialist, the Legislature of Alaska, respectfully requests the Honorable A. J. Dimond, Delegate to Congress from Alaska, to notify President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Secretary of Labor Frances L. Perkins, and such other persons as is conveniently possible, including members of Congress from States which have not approved the amendment, of the attitude of the Legislature of Alaska on this important question.

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### HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 49

TO THE HONORABLE THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE  
OF THE UNITED STATES, AND TO THE HONORABLE A. J.  
DIMOND, DELEGATE FROM ALASKA:

Your Memorialist, the Legislature of Alaska, respectfully represents that the United States Forest Service of the United States Department of Agriculture has possession and occupancy of a tract of tide lands and water front at Sitka, Alaska, known and designated as a U. S. Forest Reserve, and which is situated in front of the tract of upland occupied by the Alaska Pioneers' Home, and which water front and tide lands include all the tide lands south of Waterfront Street and extending from Lincoln Street to the side of the main building of the Sitka Cold Storage Company.

That there are no improvements on said tract of tide lands save a small office building and a float, both of which are of little value;

That the holding of said tract in a reserve prevents its use for any useful purpose;

That said tract would be of great value to the Territory in connection with the Alaska Pioneers' Home at Sitka, and since the same is practically open at the present time and not occupied with any permanent or valuable structures:
