HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 64

TO THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE,
ALASKA GAME COMMISSION:

Your Memorialist, the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, in Thirteenth Regular Session assembled, does most respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, there are many thousands of square miles of good feeding grounds in the interior of Alaska not being utilized by our native big game species, to-wit, moose, mountain sheep, and caribou, and

WHEREAS, buffalo which were transplanted in the Tanana Valley in 1928 have thrived beyond all expectations, and

WHEREAS, there still remains huge areas not fitted for the grazing of any of the above mentioned big game animals, and

WHEREAS, the sportsmen of interior Alaska have long petitioned for the introduction of elk in that region, and

WHEREAS, it is believed that elk will find conditions suitable for their increase and not interfere with, nor compete against, any other big game species now in Alaska, and

WHEREAS, it appears that elk are able to protect themselves against wolves, coyotes and other predators,

NOW, THEREFORE, your Memorialist, the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, most respectfully urges that the Alaska Game Commission take steps to transplant a number of elk to some favorable area in the interior of Alaska.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 65

TO THE HONORABLE ANTHONY J. DIMOND, DELEGATE TO
CONGRESS FROM ALASKA:

Your Memorialist, the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska in thirteenth regular session assembled, most respectfully represents:

WHEREAS, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved June 14, 1906, it is unlawful for any person not a citizen of, or has not declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States, and who is not a bona fide resident of the United States, to catch or kill, or attempt to catch or kill, except with rod, spear or gaff, any fish of any kind in the waters of Alaska under the jurisdiction of the United States, exception, however, being made that such citizens can employ as laborers, aliens or people not bona fide residents of the United States, and this has resulted in the employment of a large number of such aliens, to the detriment of bona fide citizens desiring to earn a living in the Territory; and

WHEREAS, it is believed that the said Act of June 14, 1906 should be amended to limit the employment of such aliens to shore work only and to require that the actual fishing be done by citizens; and

NOW, THEREFORE, your Memorialist prays that the Act of June 14, 1906, be amended by adding the words "on shore or in canneries, salteries or refrigeration plants afloat" after the word "laborers" and before the word "any" in the last paragraph of Section 1 of the said Act.
