

WHEREAS, the residents of this Territory are much indebted to the President of the United States for the deep personal interest he has manifested in Alaska and for the constructive policies he has inaugurated; and

WHEREAS, all of our citizens are anxious for an opportunity to personally express and show their appreciation to the President of the United States for his action in our behalf; and

WHEREAS, the residents of Alaska feel that great advantage would accrue to the United States as a whole if the Chief Executive should by personal inspection gain first-hand information concerning this great Territory and be afforded an opportunity to personally meet and know its people.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, the House concurring, that it is the sense of the people of Alaska that a cordial invitation should be and the same is hereby respectfully tendered to the Honorable Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States, to visit Alaska, meet the people thereof, gain first-hand information relative to the Territory; its problems and its resources and grant out citizens an opportunity to personally express their deep appreciation for the great services rendered, and being rendered, to the people of the Territory and the Nation by our Chief Executive.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Honorable John W. Troy, Governor of Alaska, be requested to forward a copy of this Resolution to President Franklin D. Roosevelt, together with such other and further expressions of appreciation and friendship from the people of Alaska to their Chief Executive as to the Governor shall seem meet and proper.

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### SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3

WHEREAS, there has been a great accumulation of correspondence and documents pertaining to business done in Territorial offices, and many of such documents and letters are no longer of value, either to the Territory or to others and serve only to cause a congestion in filing; and

WHEREAS, the filing space of the Territorial Legislature has also exceeded its capacity and much of the contents of the files included within the same is no longer of use or value; and

WHEREAS, all such documents and papers that have been on file for more than ten years and which do not constitute permanent records, and all other documents and publications which have become obsolete or worthless, should be destroyed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Thirteenth Session of the Legislature of Alaska, that a committee composed of one member from each of the offices of the Governor, the Commissioner of Education, the Treasurer, and the Auditor, examine into and take the necessary steps to destroy all such papers; and that a similar Committee composed of a representative of each of the offices of the Senate and House of Representatives, together with a member of the office of the Secretary of Alaska, take like action in connection with the files of the Legislature; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that each of the said Committees shall make a report of the documents destroyed by it, from any office, for permanent filing in such offices.

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#### SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 4

WHEREAS, the Governor of Alaska has submitted to the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska the names of two members for the Board of Regents of the University of Alaska for re-appointment and the name of one member for the Board of Regents of the University of Alaska to succeed Martin Harrais, deceased.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Territory of Alaska, and the House of Representatives concurring that a joint session of the Alaska Territorial Legislature be held on March 9, 1937, at 2:30 P. M. in the Chamber of the House for the purpose of considering the reappointments and appointment aforementioned and confirming or rejecting the same.
