

Legislature should create a standing committee charged with the duty of meeting the Committee from Congress on its arrival in Alaska, and rendering to such committee every possible assistance in arranging its itinerary and public hearings in a manner most adaptable and convenient to the people of Alaska and best calculated to accomplish the desired results; and,

WHEREAS, It appears necessary and desirable that the members of said standing committee of this Legislature, or some of them should travel with the Congressional Party throughout the Territory in order to further assist the Congressional Committee in obtaining a true picture of the situation which exists in Alaska's Fisheries at the present time:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Legislature hereby petitions the Congress of the United States to create and appoint a Congressional Committee for the investigation of the Alaska Fisheries, and that a committee of this Legislature, composed of five members from the House and Senate, at least two of whom shall be from each House, be selected by the members of the House and Senate in Joint Session assembled; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this committee shall be known as the Joint Committee on Fisheries, and shall be charged with the duty of facilitating and assisting a Congressional investigation of the Alaska Fisheries, in the manner hereinbefore set forth; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Judiciary Committee of the House and Senate be requested to present a Bill in proper form, appropriating the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00), to carry out the provisions of this Resolution.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 2.

WHEREAS, employees of the Alaska Road Commission, and living in camps provided by that organization, have repeatedly protested against certain accommodations furnished them; and

WHEREAS, although the said Alaska Road Commission makes a charge for these accommodations at the rate of approximately Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) per month; and

WHEREAS, most, if not all, the Alaska Road Commission's camps furnish only canvas-covered cots or spring cots but no mattresses, and these are highly uncomfortable and fail totally to provide restful and healthful sleep; and

WHEREAS, a great percentage of the Alaska Road Commission employees are old-time Alaskans; and

WHEREAS, private contractors and industrial camps in Alaska provide accommodations in keeping with modern times;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, the Senate concurring, that the Alaska Road Commission take immediate action to furnish its camps with sleeping accommodations including mattresses at least equal to those provided by industry or private contractors.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3.

WHEREAS, copies of the Compiled Laws of Alaska 1933, were furnished to each member of the Fourteenth Session of the Alaska Legislature for the use of the members in consideration of legislation before them; and,

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the said members to take the said Compiled Laws to their respective homes at the end of the session;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That each member of the Fourteenth Session of the Alaska Legislature be permitted to take the volume used by him during the present session, with him.
