NOW, THEREFORE, Your Memorialist respectfully prays that the Office of Indian Affairs, as speedily as possible, convert said White Mountain buildings into an institute for the care and treatment of Native tubercular patients.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 36.

TO THE HONORABLE FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED:

Your Memorialist, the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, in Fourteenth Regular Session assembled, respectfully submits that:

WHEREAS, the residents of Alaska are as fully citizens of the United States of America as are the residents of the forty-eight states and entitled to the same privileges as the citizens residing in said states; and,

WHEREAS, said residents of Alaska have at various times expressed their desire to have a greater measure of self government, including control of the Fisheries, this being indicated by the fact that both major political parties have embodied this request in their platforms;

NOW, THEREFORE, Your Memorialist respectfully urges Congress to pass and the President to sign H. R. No. 2411, introduced

in the Seventy-sixth Congress by Alaska Delegate, the Honorable Anthony J. Dimond on January 12, 1939.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 37.

TO THE HONORABLE, THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES, AND TO THE HONORABLE ANTHONY J. DIMOND, DELEGATE TO CONGRESS FROM THE TERRITORY OF ALASKA:

Your Memorialist, the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, in Fourteenth Regular Session assembled, respectfully submits that:

WHEREAS, the City of Nome, Alaska is the most important seaport of Northwestern United States and the center of a large mining area; and,

WHEREAS, storms sweeping from the Arctic Ocean or Bering Sea frequently menace the safety of the port and annually do heavy damage to property; and,

WHEREAS, the Honorable Anthony J. Dimond, Delegate to Congress from the Territory of Alaska, has introduced a measure (H. R. 2412) in the 76th Congress, 1st Session, seeking the construction of a sheet-steel pile revetment for the protection of the port;

NOW, THEREFORE, your Memorialist endorses the said H. R. 2412 and respectfully urges its immediate enactment into law.
