

soon as practicable thereafter shall set up as many Tubercular wards in each hospital as may be deemed practical and advisable in accordance with the results of the survey conducted.

Section 3. All equipment purchased in the furtherance of this Act shall remain the property of the Territory of Alaska forever, and each hospital shall, on or before the first day of February in each year, file with the Territorial Commissioner of Health, a complete and full inventory of goods or equipment belonging to the Territory.

Section 4. The sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary for the biennium 1943-1945, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Territorial Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to carry out the provisions of this Act. Said sum shall be expended by the Territorial Commissioner of Health, acting by and with the consent and advice of the Territorial Board of Administration, and shall be paid by the Treasurer upon vouchers approved by the Territorial Auditor and Territorial Commissioner of Health.

CHAPTER 47.

AN ACT

[S. B. 26]

To amend Chapter 34 of the Session Laws of Alaska of 1941 relating to the filing of DELAYED BIRTH CERTIFICATES, and declaring an emergency.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Section 1. That Chapter 34 of the Session Laws of Alaska, 1941, be amended to read as follows:

“Section 1. All persons born in the Territory of Alaska for whom no legal birth certificate has been filed, may, if they so desire, have a standard certificate of their birth executed by the doctor, midwife, parents or others who know the facts of the birth, and such certificate shall be supported by the affidavit of the person executing the certificate and by the affidavits of two other persons who know the facts and know the statements in said certificate are true and correct. The said certificate is to be filed in the manner and form required by Section 3197, Compiled Laws of Alaska, 1933.

Documentary
evidence in
lieu of affidavits.

In the event that it is impractical to secure sufficient witnesses to a birth certificate the applicant may submit in lieu of the affidavits documentary evidence consisting of certificates along the following lines:

Baptismal, cradle roll, or other church record

Family Bible record

Physician or hospital record

Birth certificate of the registrant's child

Record from a local, State, or Federal census

School Record

Insurance Policy

Other acceptable records

Affidavit

That two such certificates of documental evidence will be sufficient to qualify the certificate for filing, and be prima facie evidence of the time and the place of birth of the registrant, and that it shall be so accepted.”

Section 2. That the Registrar of Vital Statistics shall make all necessary rules and regulations to carry the above into effect.

Section 3. An emergency is hereby declared to exist Emergency. and this Act shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval.

CHAPTER 48.

AN ACT

[H. B. 90]

To supply a deficiency in the appropriation for livestock inspection for the biennium ending March 31, 1943 and declaring an emergency.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Section 1. That to meet a deficiency in the appropriation for livestock inspection under the provisions of Section 625, et seq C. L. A. 1933, for the biennium ending March 31, 1943, the sum of \$108.33 is hereby appropriated to compensate Carl H. Meier for the loss of cattle owned by him, which were slaughtered in carrying out the provisions of the Act aforesaid.
