

Sec. 26-1-1. CERTAIN PERSONS ENTITLED TO LIEN FOR WORK OR LABOR DONE OR MATERIALS FURNISHED. Any person or firm, contractor, lumber merchant, architect, engineer, designer, mechanic, artisan, machinist, tradesman, plumber, electrician, carpenter, painter, laborer, teamster, drayman, and other persons performing design or supervision services or performing any labor upon or preliminary to the construction of, or furnishing any material for the construction, alteration or repair, either in whole or in part, of any building, wharf, bridge, flume, fence, machinery or aqueduct, or any structure or superstructure, shall have a lien upon the same for the work or labor done or material furnished at the instance of the owner of the building or other improvement, or his agent.

Persons entitled to lien.

Section 2. An emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this Act shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage.

CHAPTER 21

AN ACT

[S. B. 7]

To amend Section 20-1-4, Alaska Compiled Laws Annotated 1949, prescribing penalties for discrimination in providing full and equal accommodations, facilities and privileges to all citizens in places of accommodation within the jurisdiction of the Territory of Alaska.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Section 1. That Section 20-1-4, Alaska Compiled Laws Annotated 1949, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 20-1-4. Violation as misdemeanor: Punishment. Any person who shall violate or aid or incite a violation of said full and equal enjoyment; or any person who shall display any printed or written sign indicating a discrimination on racial grounds of said full and equal enjoyment, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in jail for not more than thirty (30) days or fined not more than two hundred fifty (\$250.00) dollars, or both.

CHAPTER 22

AN ACT

[S. B. 5]

Authorizing Banks to operate on the basis of a five-day week.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Section 1. Any bank, trust company or savings and loan association organized under or doing business under the laws of Alaska, or any national bank, may remain closed on any day of the week fixed at least fifteen days in advance by the adoption of a resolution to such effect by a majority vote of the Board of Directors thereof, and notice thereof posted in the bank or trust company or savings and loan association for the same time.
