CHAPTER 106

AN ACT

[H. B. 48]

Relating to providing aid to dependent children, increasing the maximum benefits therefor; defining "Dependent Child" and "Assistance"; amending Sections 51-2-31 and 51-2-33 ACLA 1949, as amended by Ch. 57 S.L.A. 1949; and fixing an effective date.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Section 1. That Sec. 51-2-31 ACLA 1949, as amended by Ch. 57 S. L. A. 1949, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Definitions.

Section 51-2-31. Definitions. As used in this Act:

(a) "Welfare Department" means the Department of Public Welfare created by Chapter 3, Extraordinary Session Laws, 1937 (Sections 51-1-1—51-1-5 herein).

(b) "Dependent Child" means a needy child under the age of sixteen, or under the age of eighteen years if regularly attending school, who has been deprived of parental support or

care by reason of the death, continual absence from the home, or physical or mental incapacity of a parent, and who is living with his father, mother, grandfather, grandmother, brother, sister, stepfather, stepmother, stepbrother, step-sister, uncle or aunt, in a place of residence maintained by one or more of such relatives as his or their own home.

(c) "Assistance" means monthly money payments with respect to a dependent child or children, and the relative with whom the dependent child is living.

Assistance.

Section 2. That Section 51-2-33 ACLA 1949, as amended by Ch. 57 S. L. A. 1949, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 51-2-33. Amount of Assistance. The amount of assistance which shall be granted for any dependent child, and the relative with whom the dependent child is living, shall be determined by the Welfare Department with due regard to the resources and necessary expenditures of the family and the condition existing in each case and shall be sufficient, when added to all other income and support available to the child, to provide such child and relative with reasonable subsistence compatible with decency and health; provided, however, that the amount of assistance granted shall not exceed sixty dollars (\$60.00) where there is a relative and one child, and where there is more than one such child, the amount allowed for the relative and first child shall not exceed sixty dollars (\$60.00) and the amount for each additional child shall not exceed thirty dollars (\$30.00).

Section 3. The effective date of this Act shall be June 1, 1951.

CHAPTER 107

AN ACT

[H. B. 64]

To advertise Alaska's tourist attractions and otherwise promote the tourist industry in the Territory, providing for Territorial support thereof, making an appropriation.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Purpose.

Section 1. STATEMENT OF PURPOSE. Recognizing that the tourist industry is one which if properly promoted can become a major source of revenue for the Territory of Alaska and its people, it is hereby declared to be the purpose of the Territorial government to encourage the development of a greater tourist industry for Alaska through public support of an advertising and promotional campaign to attract visitors to the Territory.

Limitation on expenditure of Territorial moneys.

Section 2. Territorial moneys in the amounts herein and hereafter appropriated shall be expended exclusively for display advertising space in magazines and newspapers of the United States and/or Canada in publicizing the Territory of Alaska for the purpose of promoting Alaska's tourist attractions. Such advertising shall be produced and distributed by or under the direction of the Alaska Visitors Association, incorporated under the laws of the Territory of Alaska for the purpose of promoting Alaska's tourist industry. Territorial moneys shall be issued to said Alaska Visitors Association by warrants
