

Japan which will end the United States occupation and end the power of the United States to control Japanese fishing, and the only manner in which the fisheries of the United States and Canada may be protected from the encroachment of the Japanese in the future is through the treaty which is now being considered.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the legislature of the Territory of Alaska that the menace to the aforesaid fisheries through a revival of Japanese fishing in the waters off the coast of Alaska and British Columbia which will result unless steps are taken to safeguard the fisheries of the two countries, be brought to the immediate attention of the President of the United States and the Secretary of State and to the Congress of the United States, and that the President and the Secretary of State be urged to take immediate steps to have included in any treaty with Japan a provision that no Japanese fishing vessels will be permitted to engage in the fisheries of the Pacific Coast which have been fished and in which the fishing industry has been developed by fishermen of Canada and the United States, with a reciprocal provision that vessels of the United States not be permitted to fish in the waters of Japan, and that the Senate of the United States be requested to refuse to ratify any peace treaty with Japan which does not have full and adequate provisions for safeguarding the fisheries in the coastal waters of Alaska and in the Northeastern Pacific Ocean adjacent thereto.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this Resolution be forwarded by air mail to the President of the United States, the Secretary of State, the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of House of Representatives of the United States, the Delegate to Congress from Alaska, and the Governor of Alaska.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED By the Senate of the Territorial Legislature in Twentieth Session assembled that congratulations are hereby extended by the official representatives of the people of Alaska to the Boy Scout movement, to the hundreds of boys who are participating in it in Alaska and to the many volunteer leaders who are devoting their time and effort to this splendid program.
