

public street or highway, to carry in a raised or extended position a cane or walking stick which is white in color or white tipped with red.

Section 2. Whenever a pedestrian is crossing or attempting to cross a public street or highway, guided by a guide dog or carrying in a raised or extended position a cane or walking stick which is white in color or white tipped with red, the driver of every vehicle approaching the intersection, or place where such pedestrian is attempting to cross, shall bring his vehicle to a full stop before arriving at such intersection or place of crossing, and before proceeding shall take such precautions as may be necessary to avoid injuring such pedestrian.

Vehicles required to stop.

Section 3. Nothing contained in this Act shall be construed to deprive any totally or partially blind or otherwise incapacitated person, not carrying such a cane or walking stick or not being guided by a dog, of the rights and privileges conferred by law upon pedestrians crossing streets or highways, nor shall the failure of such totally or partially blind or otherwise incapacitated person to carry a cane or walking stick, or to be guided by a guide dog upon the streets, highways or sidewalks of this Territory, create a presumption of contributory negligence.

Contributory negligence not presumed.

Section 4. Any person who violates any provision of this Act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or by imprisonment in the Federal jail for not more than 30 days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Penalty for violation.

## CHAPTER 10

### AN ACT

[S. B. 9]

To permit residents of Alaska to donate their eyes while living to designated beneficiaries after death.

*Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:*

Section 1. Any resident of Alaska of legal age is hereby empowered to donate by written instrument while living one of his or her eyes or both of his or her eyes to any individual, partnership, association, corporation or hospital, the eye or eyes so donated to be removed (without the consent of the heirs or devisees of the donor) after the death of the donor by any physician licensed to practice medicine and surgery in the Territory of Alaska.

Donation of eyes  
empowered.

*Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:*

Section 1. Chapter 65, Session Laws of Alaska 1949, is hereby repealed.

## CHAPTER 12

### AN ACT

[S. B. 11]

To authorize payment of salary to Jovita L. Cabigas for services rendered in the Department of Taxation; and declaring an emergency.

*Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:*

Section 1. The Department of Taxation is hereby authorized to pay to Jovita L. Cabigas, upon a duly presented voucher properly approved, the sum of \$130.00 in payment of clerical services rendered by her in the Department
