

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 2

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE LEGISLATURE
OF THE TERRITORY OF ALASKA:

WHEREAS, our Heavenly Father saw fit to relieve our esteemed colleague, Territorial Senator Gunnard M. Engebret, of his earthly burdens; and

WHEREAS, the Honorable Gunnard M. Engebret, during his many years residence in the Territory of Alaska, toiled unceasingly for the progressive welfare of Alaska's citizens, and for the development of the territory's natural resources; and

WHEREAS, the Honorable Gunnard M. Engebret admirably served the people of Alaska for several sessions in the capacity of Territorial Senator; and

WHEREAS, the outstanding qualities of leadership and integrity of character exemplified by the late Honorable Gunnard M. Engebret, prompted his colleagues to bestow upon him the unprecedented honor of twice electing him to serve as president of the Territorial Senate; and

WHEREAS, the late Honorable Gunnard M. Engebret was a kindly man of generous disposition; a man of great moral fortitude and intelligence; and

WHEREAS, his presence at the Twenty-First Session of the Alaska Legislature is sorely missed by all who had the good fortune to know him and work with him;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska in Twenty-First Session assembled, that we mourn the passing of the Honorable Gunnard M. Engebret and desire, by this resolution, to convey our sympathy to his bereaved family; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that when the Senate adjourns on this, the 23rd day of March, 1953, it shall do so in

honor of the memory of the late Senator Gunnard M. Engebret; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to have suitably engrossed copies of this Resolution prepared and forwarded to Violet M. Engebret, wife of the late Honorable Gunnard M. Engebret, 430 Crescent Avenue, River Falls, Wisconsin, and to Arthur Engebret brother, Anchorage, Alaska.

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 3

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE TERRITORY OF ALASKA:

WHEREAS, Anaktuvuk Pass, Alaska, does not have a school or a school building; and

WHEREAS, the course of study, teaching methods, and organization of the Territorial schools are primarily set up for children of families at least partially assimilated into the American way of life; and

WHEREAS, the Census of 1950 revealed the existence of a group of sixty-six nomadic Eskimos, including thirty children of school age, who spend the summers at Anaktuvuk Pass in order that these Eskimo children may qualify for educational benefits available to them under existing Territorial law when and if a suitable school building is provided for the community; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Education is operated under rules and regulations of the Territorial Board of Education and could only establish a special school if there was a building owned for the purpose by the community, or some person, until the school proved itself to be a permanent school with an en-
