SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 2

Be it Resolved by the Senate of the Alaska Legislature:

WHEREAS, Our Heavenly Father on November 29, 1954, saw fit to relieve our esteemed colleague, former Territorial Senator Edward Anderson of Nome, Alaska, of his earthly burdens; and

WHEREAS, the Honorable Edward Anderson, during his 48 years of residence in the Territory of Alaska, toiled unceasingly for progressive welfare of Alaska's citizens, and for the development of the Territory's natural resources; and

WHEREAS, the Honorable Edward Anderson admirably served the people of Alaska for several sessions in the House of Representatives and the Territorial Senate; and

WHEREAS, the outstanding sincere integrity of character exemplified by the late Honorable Edward Anderson prompted his constituents

to keep sending him back to the Legislature for several sessions; and

WHEREAS, the late Honorable Edward Anderson was a kindly man of generous disposition; a man of great moral fortitude and intelligence;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Alaska Legislature in Twenty-Second Session assembled, that we mourn the passing of the Honorable Edward Anderson and desire, by this resolution, to convey our sympathy to his bereaved family; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that when the Senate adjourns on this, the 9th day of February, 1955, it shall do so in honor of the memory of the late Edward Anderson; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to have a suitably

engrossed copy of this Resolution prepared and forwarded to Anna Anderson, wife of the late Honorable Edward Anderson, Front Street, Nome, Alaska.

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 3

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Territory of Alaska:

WHEREAS, the workmen's compensation benefits must be maintained at a level to insure adequate medical attention and care of workmen injured through no fault of their own; and

WHEREAS, the cost of workmen's compensation insurance in Alaska is much greater than in any other jurisdiction under the American flag; and

WHEREAS, the present law needs attention, study and overhauling to make it applicable to Alaska's needs;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Territory of Alaska, in Twenty-second Regular Session assembled: that the Legislative Council make thorough study of the workmen's compensation law and possible methods of financing adequate benefits at reasonable cost, and report thereon to the Twenty-third Legislature.
