

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 4

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Territory of Alaska:

WHEREAS, many persons residing in and about Ketchikan, Alaska including their families and guests, and many tourists, are in the habit of going on outings, or otherwise visiting for recreation purposes, Ward Cove Drainage Area, which is the single large public recreation site in the area; and

WHEREAS, said users of the Ward Cove Drainage Area are becoming increasingly alarmed at the frequent wanton discharge of firearms in and near the Ward Cove Area, which discharges are a constant threat to their safety, and well-being; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of Alaska in 1935, foreseeing the considerable danger of permitting any discharge, flourishing, or pointing of firearms in public places, including parks, public grounds and grounds made public by an assemblage of persons, did prohibit such ill-advised practices in Section 1 of Chapter 42 of the Session Laws of that Legislature, and did estab-

lish a penalty, including a fine and imprisonment to be imposed upon the conviction of any person violating said Section, which law still stands as current, valid, and enforceable law in Alaska; and

WHEREAS, it is the duty and responsibility of the Territorial Police and other enforcement officers to enforce said law, and to prevent, where possible, violations of the law, especially in those parts of Alaska which are not within the jurisdiction of local police;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate of the Territory of Alaska, in Twenty-third Session assembled, that the Superintendent of Territorial Police be directed to forthwith take the necessary steps to cause persons violating Sec. 65-12-5 ACLA 1949 in the Ward Cove Drainage Area to be cited and prosecuted for such violations, and to further prevent, to the greatest degree possible, all future violations.

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 5

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Territory of Alaska:

WHEREAS, it is important and essential to the well-being of Alaska and its economy that workmen's compensation benefits be maintained at a level that will insure complete and adequate medical attention and care to the workmen of Alaska; and

WHEREAS, the determination of

benefits to be paid must of necessity be based on information and statistics which manifest the true relationship between premiums paid and benefits received, and particularly the total amounts received by injured workers for different classes of injuries; and

WHEREAS, information upon which may be based an adequate study for the purpose of determin-
