HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Be It Resolved by the House in the First Legislature First Session Assembled, the Senate Concurring:

WHEREAS, the Sovereign State of Indiana has extended congratulations and best wishes to the newly created Sovereign State of Alaska; and

WHEREAS, the people of Alaska are grateful for their heritage of freedom, a substantial portion of which is directly attributable to the great State of Indiana; and

WHEREAS, the people of Alaska are deeply appreciative of the expression of good will by the Sovereign State of Indiana; and

WHEREAS, the Sovereign State of Indiana has produced many native sons and daughters now citizens of the Sovereign State of Alaska, one of whom is the Honorable and Distinguished Alaska State Senator George B. McNabb, Jr. who originally resided in the town of Carthage in the State of Indiana; and

WHEREAS, the Honorable Senator George B. McNabb, Jr. is ably contributing to the formation and development of democratic institutions of government

in the Sovereign State of Alaska predicated upon his heritage from the Sovereign State of Indiana;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this first session of the first legislature of the State of Alaska by these presents accepts with profound gratitude the congratulations and good will of the Sovereign State of Indiana; and

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3

Be it Resolved by the House of Representatives in the First Legislature, First Session Assembled, the Senate Concurring:

WHEREAS, the agricultural and mineral development of that area between Hope and Kenai, Alaska, along Cook Inlet, has been seriously curtailed because of the lack of adequate overland transportation in such area; and

WHEREAS, the completion of a road in this region would permit travel between Hope and Kenai at a considerable saving in miles and fuel over travel by the only existing route; and

WHEREAS, such road would further provide a means of evacuating the residents of the populous Anchorage area in

the event of a crisis or calamity;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the State of Alaska in First Session assembled, the Senate concurring, that construction of said road is urged; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be properly engrossed and thereafter transmitted to the Honorable William A. Egan, Governor of Alaska; the Honorable Hugh J. Wade, Acting Governor of Alaska; the Honorable Frank Metcalf, Commissioner of Highways and Public Works; and the State Board of Highways and Public Works.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Relating to requesting the Governor to transmit a building and construction program for juvenile correction and rehabilitation facilities.

Be it Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Legislature of the State of Alaska in First Session Assembled, the Senate Concurring:

WHEREAS, the juvenile problem in Alaska continues to be of great concern to the people of Alaska and to the Legislature; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of this problem, the Legislature authorized an appropriation in 1957 for the purpose of constructing a juvenile institution to assist
