4. Without the grant there will be a general reduction of public health protection both to Alaskan citizens and to Alaska's military population, while the new state bends its every effort and resource to establish its new state government;

5. The ends achieved by the grant are of national importance. Research projects of the Arctic Health Research Center benefit the nation as a whole; sanitation and engineering projects support-

ed by the Alaska Grant, benefit and protect the U. S. military establishment, as do all the other projects supported by the grant. The new state, particularly during its formative years, cannot meet all these costs which benefit all of the United States;

THEREFORE, it is urged that the executive and legislative branches of the United States Government preserve and maintain during future years the appropriation for public health services of national significance in Alaska at not less than its present level of approximately six hundred and fifty thousand dollars annually.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 3

To the Honorable Lewis L. Strauss, Secretary of Commerce; the Honorable E. L. Bartlett and the Honorable Ernest Gruening, Senators from Alaska; the Honorable Ralph J. Rivers, Representative from Alaska; the Honorable Ellis L. Armstrong, Commissioner of the Bureau of Public Roads; the Honorable Edgar H. Swick, Regional Engineer, Region Ten, Bureau of Public Roads:

Your Memorialist, the Legislature of the State of Alaska in First Session assembled, respectfully submits that:

WHEREAS, the agricultural and mineral development of that area between Hope and Kenai, Alaska, along Cook Inlet, has been seriously curtailed because of the lack of adequate overland

transportation in such area; and

WHEREAS, the completion of a road in this region would permit travel between Hope and Kenai at a considerable saving in miles and fuel over travel by the only existing route; and

WHEREAS, such road would further provide a means of evacuating the residents of the populace Anchorage area in the event of a crisis or calamity;

NOW, THEREFORE, your Memorialist, the Legislature of the State of Alaska in First Session assembled, respectfully urges the construction of said road.

And your Memorialist will ever pray.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 4

To the Honorable Fred A. Seaton, Secretary of the Interior; the Honorable E. L. Bartlett and the Honorable Ernest Gruening, Senators from Alaska; and the Honorable Ralph J. Rivers, Representative from Alaska:

Your Memorialist, the Legislature of the State of Alaska in First Legislature,

First Session assembled, respectfully represents:

WHEREAS, by virtue of the provisions of the Act of February 26, 1944 (58 Stat. 100; U.S.C., secs. 631a-631q), as confirmed by Public Law 85-508, "an Act to provide for the admission of the State of Alaska into the Union", the Secretary of

the Interior is granted the authority to permit sealing on the Pribilof Islands and to supervise the sale of the sealskins so taken on these islands which are part of the State of Alaska; and

WHEREAS, as a part of this general supervision of the Pribilof seal industry, the Secretary has permitted only the most basic processing of these sealskins—a resource of Alaska with annual revenue approaching a million dollars—to be accomplished within the state, the finish processing taking place in St. Louis, Missouri, also the site of the annual sealskin sale; and

WHEREAS, if these Alaska sealskins were processed to the point of sale in Alaska itself, the following benefits would thereby arise:

(1) The economy of the State would be materially aided by the local employment created in such new sealskin processing industry;

(2) The revenue to the United

States and to Alaska derived from the sale of sealskins would be considerably raised by cutting down the present processing cost arising out of the necessity of shipping the unfinished sealskins such a distance prior to their final processing and sale;

(3) The quality of the sealskins sold would rise due to the location of the finishing site close to the harvesting grounds thereby increasing the control of the finishers over the methods of the harvesters;

NOW THEREFORE, Your Memorialist, the Legislature of the State of Alaska, on behalf of the people of Alaska, respectfully urges the Secretary of the Interior and the Congress of the United States to remove the site of the sealskin finishing industry to the State of Alaska and to thereafter direct that the sale of such Alaska product be held within the State of Alaska.

Alaska have been and will continue to be the best of neighbors as equal sister states of the Union; and

WHEREAS, the growth of the State of Oregon in the past one hundred years has been phenomenal, far surpassing any predictions that could have been made in 1859; and

WHEREAS, the new and growing State of Alaska has much to learn in the ways of government and general economic development from the hundred years of Oregon history;

NOW THEREFORE, Your Memorialist, the Legislature of the State of Alaska, on behalf of the people of Alaska, extends warmest congratulations and best wishes to the people of Oregon, on this, the occasion of the State's centennial celebration.
