

SENATE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 21

To the Honorable William A. Egan, Governor of Alaska! and the Honorable Hugh J. Wade, Acting Governor of Alaska:

Your Memorialist, the Legislature of the State of Alaska in First Legislature, First Session assembled respectfully submits that:

WHEREAS, there is a need for financial assistance to several school districts of Alaska where, despite the full measure of state support provided comparable districts, and despite local taxation equal to or beyond the state average, such districts are unable to meet school financial needs primarily because of the impact of Native populations; and

WHEREAS, there is need for more high school programs throughout Alaska, and particularly a need for local and regional high schools in the vast area of Alaska inhabited primarily by Native peoples; and

WHEREAS, there is a need for provision of transportation and subsistence funds to Native families for the support of their children to live in areas serviced by a high school; and

WHEREAS, there is need for development of a long-range plan for transfer of operational responsibility of the schools presently operated by the Bureau of Indian Affairs to the State of Alaska on a planned and scheduled basis which would insure that adequate building facilities were available, and would further insure necessary and adequate financial support through the Bureau of Indian Affairs for the operation of such schools;

NOW THEREFORE, Your Memorialist does respectfully request that the Office of Governor of Alaska initiate a request for complete policy discussions to be held with the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, the Secretary of the Interior, representatives of the Juneau Area Office of the Bureau of Indian

Affairs, representatives of the Department of Education, and representatives of the Alaska Legislative Council, with a view to developing a long-range agreement which will encompass the following points:

(1) A plan for transfer of operational and major financial responsibility of the present Bureau of Indian Affairs day schools to the State of Alaska on a planned and scheduled long range basis which would cover a 15 to 20 year period. Included in such plan there would need to be specific provision that the Bureau of Indian Affairs would provide necessary and adequate school facilities at each location before the state would accept title and assume major financial responsibility.

(2) Consideration of the need for more high school programs throughout Alaska and particularly the need for local and regional high schools for at least the 9th and 10th grade level, with the continuation of Mt. Edgecumbe as a regional high school for the 11th and 12th grades and to serve Southeast Alaska as necessary.

(3) Arrangements whereby the Bureau of Indian Affairs would provide transportation and subsistence funds to families for the support of their pupils to live in such places as Bethel, Dillingham, Kodiak, Nome, Fairbanks, Anchorage, Palmer, Cordova, Juneau, Petersburg, Sitka, Ketchikan and Valdez while attending local high schools.

(4) The provision of financial assistance to school districts under the Johnson O'Malley Act in those cases where school districts, despite the full measure of state support provided comparable districts and despite local taxation equal to or beyond the state average, are unable to meet school financial needs.

Your Memorialist, the Legislature of the State of Alaska in First Legislature, First Session assembled respectfully submits that:

WHEREAS, Public Law 85-739 as passed in August, 1958, allows certain small vessels to transport merchandise to and from places within the inland waters of southeastern Alaska and Prince Rupert, British Columbia; and

WHEREAS, the vessels authorized by this law are operated by cooperatives and transport the merchandise of members on a non-profit basis; and

WHEREAS, the large, scheduled vessels serving southeastern Alaska cannot economically and expeditiously provide service between small fishing villages and the larger commercial and processing centers of southeastern Alaska; and

WHEREAS, considering the numerous

and diverse waterways of southeastern Alaska and the dependence of the area on the fishing industry it can be seen that the operation of such small vessels is essential to the total economy of that part of the state; and

WHEREAS, the present federal law authorizes the use of such small vessels only until March 15, 1960; and

WHEREAS, this time limitation leaves the operators of such vessels in doubt as to the status of their activities, and has a depressive effect on that part of the Alaskan economy that is dependent on inexpensive and effective transportation between the inland ports;

NOW THEREFORE, Your Memorialist urges that all necessary action be taken to encourage, pass and approve federal legislation to extend the limits of Public Law 85-739 for four years beyond March 15, 1960.

To the Honorable Dwight D. Eisenhower, President of the United States; the Honorable Richard Nixon, President of the United States Senate; the Honorable Sam Rayburn, Speaker of the House of Representatives; the Honorable E. L. Bartlett and the Honorable Ernest Gruening, Senators from Alaska; the Honorable Ralph J. Rivers, Representative from Alaska; the Honorable Fred A. Seaton, Secretary of the Interior; the Honorable Glenn L. Emons, Commissioner of Indian Affairs; the Honorable James E. Hawkins, Alaska Area Director, Bureau of Indian Affairs:

WHEREAS, there is at present serious lack of both elementary and secondary schools throughout the remote areas of Alaska; and

WHEREAS, the present school facilities in such areas are over-crowded, and often dangerous due to age and condition; and

WHEREAS, such conditions result in

some 300 school age children, particularly at the secondary level, being unable to attend school; and

WHEREAS, education is a prime necessity if our native people are to progress to the point of economic and social self-sufficiency; and

WHEREAS, the Juneau Area Office of the Bureau of Indian Affairs has plans for the construction of the needed school facilities for all such remote areas; and

WHEREAS, these construction plans of the Bureau of Indian Affairs clearly reflect the real and present school needs of the native communities of Alaska; and

WHEREAS, due to appropriation limitations these plans are scheduled out over a number of years, causing the building program to fall far behind current needs;

NOW THEREFORE, Your Memorialist respectfully urges that proper legislation be passed by the 86th Congress
