

CHAPTER 67

AN ACT

To clarify certain requirements pertaining to the performance of the required annual assessment of labor on unpatented mining claims, by establishing certain definitions; amending Ch. 3, Title 47, ACLA 1949 by adding two new sections; and providing for an effective date.

(H.B. 339)

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:

Section 1. Chapter 3, Title 47, ACLA 1949 is amended by the addition of two new sections to read as follows:

Sec. 47-3-61. **Surveys Included as Annual Labor.** The term "labor" where used in Sections 47-3-51, 47-3-52, and 47-3-91, ACLA 1949 shall include, without being limited to, geological, geochemical and geophysical surveys conducted by qualified experts and verified by a detailed report filed in the recording precinct office in which the claim is located which sets forth fully (a) the location of the work performed in relation to the point of discovery and boundaries of the claim, (b) the nature, extent, and cost thereof, (c) the basic findings therefrom, and (d) the name, address, and professional background of the person or persons conducting the work. Such surveys, however, may not be applied as labor for more than two consecutive years or for more than a total of five years on any one mining claim, and each such survey shall be non-repetitive of any previous survey on the same claim.

Sec. 47-3-62. **Definitions.** As used in Sec. 47-3-61:

(a) The term "geological surveys" means surveys on the ground for mineral deposits by the proper application of the principles and techniques of the science of geology as they relate to the search for and discovery of mineral deposits;

(b) The term "geochemical surveys" means surveys on the ground for mineral deposits by the proper application of the principles and techniques of the science of chemistry as they relate to the search for and discovery of mineral deposits.

(c) The term "geophysical surveys" means surveys on the ground for mineral deposits through the employment of generally recognized equipment and methods for measuring physical differences between rock types or discontinuities in geological formations;

(d) The term "qualified expert" means an individual qualified by education or experience to conduct geological, geochemical or geophysical surveys, as the case may be.

Sec. 2. This Act takes effect on the day after its passage and approval or on the day it becomes law without such approval.

CHAPTER 68

AN ACT

To recognize, reward and encourage native artists by the selection of choice examples of Alaskan native arts and crafts and for their display at the Century 21 Exposition and at other places; and providing for an effective date.

(S.B. 231)

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:

Section 1. **Legislative Finding and Intent.** The legislature finds that Alaska

has a diminishing reservoir of native artists and artisans whose skills should be recognized and rewarded so that their abilities will be appreciated and Alaska's

treasury of native arts and crafts will not be depleted and lost because of economic and social changes in the state. In order to spark statewide interest in native arts and crafts and with the hope of continuing this interest, the legislature proposes that competitions be held each summer to select the finest examples of our native art and that the pieces selected in the summer of 1961 be placed on display at the Alaska exhibit at the Century 21 Exposition.

Sec. 2. Director of Tourism to Direct Program. a. The director of tourism shall direct a continuing program of competitions to be held each summer to select outstanding examples of Alaskan native arts and crafts. He shall initiate the first competition to be held in the summer of 1961 to select items which shall be displayed subsequently at the Alaska exhibit at the Century 21 Exposition.

b. The director, after consulting with a committee from the Alaska Native Brotherhood and Sisterhood appointed by their councils from among the memberships of those organizations, shall promulgate rules and regulations for the competitions providing for, but not limited to, the following:

- (1) eligibility requirements for entrants;
- (2) categories for entry, such as basketwork, wood carving, pottery, stone work, ivory work, painting, and so forth;
- (3) criterion for selecting category winners and grand prize winners;
- (4) transportation and display of entries;
- (5) prizes and awards for winning entrants which are restricted to ribbons, cups, plaques, and so forth;
- (6) preparation of entry forms which shall
 - (a) give the name and mailing address of the entrant,
 - (b) show that each entry is the work of the entrant,
 - (c) give the minimum price that the entrant will accept for his entry,
 - (d) provide the entrant with a

choice of having his entry sold, retained for display by the state, or returned to the entrant,

(e) identify and describe the entry;

(7) restricting the entrant from entering competitions in more than one region.

Sec. 3. Regional Competitions. There shall be four regional competitions to be held each summer beginning in 1961 in the Southeastern, Southcentral, Central and Northwestern Senatorial districts. First place and honorable mention awards shall be made in each category and one grand prize award and one honorable mention award shall be made for each region.

Sec. 4. Location of Competitions. The director of tourism shall solicit invitations from the larger communities within each of the regions for holding the regional competition. The community within each region which offers the best facilities and the greatest measure of cooperation for conducting the competition shall be selected as the location of the regional competition.

Sec. 5. Judges. Judges at the regional competitions shall be selected by the director of tourism and composed of a panel of five, two of whom shall be selected from nominees of the Alaska Native Brotherhood and Sisterhood and three of whom shall be selected by the director on the basis of their knowledge and appreciation of Alaskan native arts and crafts and of art in general.

Sec. 6. Sales of Entries. Entries not selected for display purposes may be sold when authorized by the entrant for no less than the price set by the entrant on the entry form and shall be transferred to the purchaser by competition officials upon receipt of a money order or cashier's check made out to the entrant who submitted the entry purchased.

Sec. 7. Copyrights. The director of tourism shall secure copyrights on all entries selected for display at the Alaska exhibit at the Century 21 Exposition for the entrants.

Sec. 8. Other Displays. The director of tourism may display or authorize the

display of entries at places other than the regional competitions and the Century 21 Exposition.

Sec. 9. Grants and Assistance. The director of tourism may accept grants of money and other assistance from private persons or groups, from political subdivisions of this state, or from others in order to conduct and promote annual competitions and displays.

Sec. 10. Temporary Custody. In order that the competitions may be held without undue disruption and in order that win-

ning items may be displayed at the Alaska exhibit at the Century 21 Exposition or at other places, all entries submitted for judging shall be held in temporary custody by the state until such time as they are no longer needed for display, at which time they shall be disposed of in accordance with the wishes of the entrant as set forth on the entry form.

Sec. 11. Effective Date. This Act takes effect on the day after its passage and approval or on the day it becomes law without such approval.

CHAPTER 69

AN ACT

Relating to the duties of an operator involved in accident; amending Subsec. (b) of Sec. 50-5-5, ACLA 1949; amending Subsec. (f) of Sec. 3, Ch. 123, SLA 1959; amending Subsec. (g) of Sec. 3, Ch. 123, SLA 1959; and providing for an effective date.

(S.B. 208)

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:

Section 1. Subsec. (b) of Sec. 50-5-5, ACLA 1949, is amended to read as follows:

(b) The operator of any vehicle involved in an accident resulting only in damage to a vehicle which is driven or attended by any person shall immediately stop such vehicle at the scene of such accident or as close thereto as possible and shall forthwith return to, and in every event remain at, the scene of such accident until he has fulfilled the requirements of subsection (c) of this section.

The operator of any vehicle involved in an accident resulting only in damage to a vehicle which is unattended shall immediately stop at the scene of such accident and shall then and there undertake reasonable means and efforts to locate and notify the operator or owner of such damaged unattended vehicle of the name and address of the operator and owner of the vehicle striking the unattended vehicle. In the event the operator or owner of the unattended vehicle cannot be located then said operator shall leave in a conspicuous

place in or upon the unattended vehicle struck, a writing stating the name and address of the operator and of the owner of the vehicle which struck the unattended vehicle and setting forth a statement of the circumstances of such accident.

Sec. 2. Subsec. (f) of Sec. 3, Ch. 123, SLA 1959, is hereby amended to read as follows:

(f) **Immediate Notice of Accident.** The driver of a vehicle which is in manner involved in an accident resulting in bodily injury to or death of any person or total property damage to an apparent extent of one hundred dollars or more shall immediately by the quickest means of communication give notice of such accident to the local police department if such accident occurs within a municipality, otherwise to the department of state police.

Sec. 3. Subsec. (g) of Sec. 3, Ch. 123, SLA 1959, is hereby amended to read as follows:

(g) **Written Report of Accident.** The driver of a vehicle which is in any manner involved in an accident resulting in bodily injury to or death
