

use of an airport by civilian and military aircraft, and joint use is not desirable for convenience and safety factors where military operations would of necessity always have priority; and

WHEREAS, the general public would suffer further by the nuisance of controlled movement on and off the air base, and further by the lack of terminal space and normal passenger service facilities, which are sadly lacking for military needs, much less the addition of civilian commercial operators needs; and

WHEREAS, this action is wasteful of the potential of Fairbanks International

Airport, it is a reversal of years of planning and expressed federal policy, it would deprive the state of tens of thousands of dollars in landing fees, space rentals, and other revenues, and is contrary to the best interests of the general public;

NOW THEREFORE, Your Memorialist urges the Federal Aviation Agency to reconsider its disastrous and untimely action in delaying a much needed project and immediately to rescind the freeze of funds for the runway extension of the Fairbanks International Airport.

Your Memorialist, the Legislature of the State of Alaska in First Legislature, Second Session assembled respectfully submits that:

WHEREAS, the people of Alaska shall be forever grateful to the late Senator Richard L. Neuberger for his gallant sup-

port of our struggle for statehood; and

WHEREAS, it is altogether fitting and proper that this nation and especially this state should express their gratitude to Senator Neuberger and commemorate his name;

NOW THEREFORE, Your Memorialist urges the federal government to name the mountain described on the attached memorandum, which is located near the eastern gateway to the State of Alaska, Mount Neuberger as a memorial to Senator Richard L. Neuberger.
