**Relating to the construction of bush airfields.**

tion of this population and the growth of the economy is slowed by the lack of air transportation facilities; and

**Be It Resolved by the House in Second Legislature, First Session assembled:**

WHEREAS, the lack of these facilities results in difficulty in shipping freight, poor mail service and unsatisfactory personal transportation, especially in transporting emergency patients quickly to a hospital; and

WHEREAS, the development of Alaska and the well-being of its population are greatly dependent on air transportation; and

WHEREAS, the people in this area consider that the construction of bush airfields is the most important public works project applicable to their region; and

WHEREAS, the people of Alaska, realizing the importance of air transportation, voted in the November 1960 election to issue \$1,500,000 in general obligation bonds to finance the construction of bush airfields; and

WHEREAS, during the fall, winter and spring months the only means of transportation in or out of the following communities is by air;

WHEREAS, the population in the communities of Nulato, Wainwright, and Koyuk is growing, but the productive utiliza-
