

## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 8

**Relating to the dredging of a channel between the city of Cordova and the sea.**

**Be It Resolved by the Senate in Second Legislature, First Session Assembled, the House Concurring:**

WHEREAS, the city of Cordova is a city whose development is largely dependent upon access to the sea; and

WHEREAS, the present mode of access, through the Copper River flats is inadequate, due to sandbars and other obstructions and is in need of clearing and deepening to develop the full economic potential of Cordova; and

WHEREAS, it is understood that the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers is charged with the function of surveying and dredging access channels;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate, in Second Legislature, First Session assembled, the House of Representatives concurring that the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers is urged to take the proper steps in the spring of 1961 necessary to survey and dredge the channel between Cordova and the sea through the Copper River flats as a means to clearing the channel and deepening it; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be directed to the Honorable Elvis J. Stahr, Secretary of the Army; Colonel Christian Hanburger, District Engineer, Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army; and the Alaska delegation in Congress.

## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 10

**Review and revision of laws relating to licensing of insurance agents and brokers.**

**Be It Resolved by the Senate in Second Legislature, First Session Assembled, the House Concurring:**

WHEREAS, the licensing and regulation of insurance companies and their agents and of independent insurance brokers and surplus line brokers in the public interest has been a function of Alaska as a territory and as a state; and

WHEREAS, the advent of statehood and the increasing volume of insurance transactions have made apparent the need for a revision and clarification of the law on the subject in order that it may meet the

standards set by Congress in Public Law No. 15 of 1945;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate in Second Legislature, First Session assembled, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Commissioner of the Department of Commerce be and hereby is requested to make a thorough review of the state insurance code, and with the assistance of the Department of Law, report his findings and recommendations regarding the need for a substantive comprehensive review of the state insurance code to the Legislative Council by August 1, 1962, for its review and subsequent transmission to the Legislature in January, 1963.

## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 11

**Relating to the time limit on transmission of bills between houses.**

**Be It Resolved by the Senate in Second Legislature, First Session Assembled, the House Concurring:**

WHEREAS, under provisions of Uniform Rule 64 bills may not be received in one house from the other house after the fiftieth day of any regular session except those bills introduced by standing committees; and

WHEREAS, it now appears advisable to extend the time limit for transmission of bills between the House and Senate; and

WHEREAS, the time limit set forth in Uniform Rule 64 may be changed by approval of a concurrent resolution by a two-thirds vote in the affirmative of the membership to which each house is entitled;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate in Second Legislature, First Session assembled,

bled, the House concurring, that the time limit on transmission of bills between the houses during the current session be changed to allow transmission until mid-

night of the fifty-ninth day.

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### SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 13

**Relating to a study of jurisdiction and punishment of juveniles accused of felonies.**

**Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Alaska in Second Legislature, First Session Assembled, the House Concurring:**

WHEREAS, the Alaska Legislative Council is a permanent interim committee and service agency of the legislature, designed to provide assistance in the development of sound legislation in the public interest; and

WHEREAS, the present laws concern-

ing juveniles accused of felonies may require revision;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate in Second Legislature, First Session assembled, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Alaska Legislative Council be directed to undertake a study of the present laws pertaining to jurisdiction and punishment of juveniles accused of felonies and of the necessity for a revised up-to-date juvenile code covering all juvenile laws, and to prepare recommendations concerning revisions found to be needed.
