

WHEREAS a "land scrip plan" might provide residents of Alaska a dollar in scrip for every dollar of certain taxes paid to the state, and these "scrip dollars" might act as legal tender in purchasing land from the state; and

WHEREAS these "scrip dollars" would reward Alaskans for their hardships endured for, the use of their varied talents by, and their faith in the state; and

WHEREAS "land scrip" and its implication of inexpensive land would be an

incentive to attract people to Alaska;

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, the Senate concurring, that the Governor is requested to direct the Department of Natural Resources to conduct a feasibility study of a land scrip plan and to submit this study to the First Session of the Third Alaska Legislature when it convenes in January, 1963.

### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 40

**Relating to the use of historical Sitka as the historical focal point of the Alaska Centennial in 1967.**

**Be It Resolved by the House in Second Legislature, Second Session Assembled, the Senate Concurring:**

WHEREAS arrangements are now underway for a state-wide observance of Alaska's centennial year in 1967 to commemorate its acquisition from Russia in 1867; and

WHEREAS the birth of Alaska as an American territory took place at Sitka which served as its last Russian and first American capital; and

WHEREAS the annual observance of the formal transfer from Russian to American hands has been for many years held with appropriate ceremony and festivity at Sitka; and

WHEREAS the community effort which has attracted all Alaskans to this historical place deserves the attention and support of the state as the focal point for the forthcoming observance of the Alaska Centennial; and

WHEREAS, in preparation for the Alaska Centennial, special attention should

be given to the preservation and restoration of historical landmarks and sites of the Russian-American period and the possibility of state, federal, and private foundation advice and support for a gradual restoration by stages on a scale to compare with the restoration as a state-federal historical site at the colonial capital of Virginia at Williamsburg;

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, the Senate concurring, that the Governor is respectfully requested to appoint a committee of interested citizens to study and prepare a report including long-range plans for making Sitka the historical focal point of the state-wide observance of the Alaska Centennial in 1967, and to make available to the committee the services and talents of the various state agencies, and solicit the support of federal officials and private organizations in determining what could and should be done to restore the historical landmarks and sites with which Sitka is so richly endowed, to remind all Alaskans of their historical heritage and to serve as a continuing attraction for visitors to the state.

### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 41

**Relating to establishing a bush airfield at Big Lake.**

**Be It Resolved by the House in Second Legislature, Second Session Assembled, the Senate Concurring:**

WHEREAS the progress and development of Alaska and the well-being of its people is dependent on the development and maintenance of transportation facilities; and

WHEREAS the airfield at Big Lake, which is merely cleared of brush and is graded occasionally, is insufficient to meet the needs of the growing population around Big Lake, resulting in high freight rates, poor mail service, prohibitive personal transportation costs, and considerable difficulty in obtaining medical attention for emergency patients; and

WHEREAS its conversion to a bush airfield would result in little additional cost to the state airfield program;

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, the Senate concurring, that the Honorable William A. Egan, Governor of Alaska, be respectfully urged to direct the Commissioner of Public Works to construct a bush airfield at the site of the present airfield at Big Lake.

### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 42

**Relating to suspension of Uniform Rule of Procedure 47 regarding the engrossment of House Bill No. 120, as amended.**

**Be It Resolved by the House in Second Legislature, Second Session Assembled, the Senate Concurring:**

WHEREAS House Bill No. 120 (Uniform Commercial Code) as passed by the House with amendments is an exceedingly lengthy bill which if engrossed would take an unconscionable length of time to re-type, proofread, and reduplicate prior to its consideration by the Senate; and

WHEREAS a complete list of technical

and substantive amendments adopted by the House has been reproduced and is now available to all members of the Senate;

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, the Senate concurring, that Uniform Rule of Procedure 47 is suspended as to the engrossment of House Bill No. 120 in order that the Senate may receive and consider the bill with a list of amendments as passed by the House attached thereto.

### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 45

**Relating to financing the University of Alaska heating plant.**

**Be It Resolved by the House in Second Legislature, Second Session Assembled, the Senate Concurring:**

WHEREAS the Legislature recognizes that the University of Alaska is in need of a new heating plant to replace old and outgrown facilities and to keep pace with the needs of a growing student population; and

WHEREAS it has been established that it is feasible for such a heating plant to be constructed by a nonprofit corporation which would sell bonds to obtain necessary construction funds and would then amortize its debts from rentals or heating service fees charged to the University over a period of years; and

WHEREAS such a method of financing would assure continuity of facility construction rather than the piecemeal con-

struction phases that would result from general fund appropriation; and

WHEREAS such a method of financing would eliminate the need for immediate financing of capital construction from current revenues of the general fund;

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, the Senate concurring, that the Board of Regents of the University of Alaska is requested to proceed with the establishment of a nonprofit corporation designed to finance the construction of the heating plant needed by the University of Alaska; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to all members of the Board of Regents of the University of Alaska.
