

WHEREAS the Commission acting on behalf of the governments of Canada, Japan, and the United States has made commendable progress in the field of off-shore and in-shore fisheries research; and

WHEREAS this vital service to the Nation and the State of Alaska has been accomplished while operating under great difficulties and with overly modest financial means;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, that it most highly commends the inter-governmental cooperation and accomplishment of the International North Pacific Fisheries Commission in its efforts to conserve and beneficially utilize the North Pacific fishery through fishery and oceanographic research, pledges its full support to the Commission and the federal government for the futherance of its work,

and urges that the financial support for its activities be expanded through the efforts of the President and the Congress of the United States; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the Honorable John F. Kennedy, President of the United States; the Honorable Lyndon B. Johnson, Vice President of the United States and President of the Senate; the Honorable John W. McCormack, Speaker of the House of Representatives; the Honorable Dean Rusk, Secretary of State; the Honorable Stewart L. Udall, Secretary of the Interior; the Honorable Edward Allen, Chairman of the International North Pacific Fisheries Commission; the Honorable Milton E. Brooding, Chairman, American Section, International North Pacific Fisheries Commission; and the members of the Alaska delegation in Congress.

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 48

Relating to a commendation of the Regional Forester for his work to improve Alaska's fisheries.

Be It Resolved by the Senate in Second Legislature, Second Session Assembled:

WHEREAS the livelihood of a large part of the population of Alaska depends upon a strong fishing industry; and

WHEREAS, because of a severe depletion of Alaska's most important fish, the salmon, the industry has suffered a corresponding decline; and

WHEREAS the United States Forest Service, through the Fisheries Research Institute, has been carrying on an experimental program of improving salmon spawning channels in certain streams in the South Tongass National Forest; and

WHEREAS this imaginative program has already produced results which indicate that the techniques used may be the foundation for rehabilitation of the entire fishing industry in Alaska; and

WHEREAS this program, initiated by the Regional Forester, P. D. Hanson, and continued with his active encouragement, exemplifies the highest form of government service to the people;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, that P. D. Hanson is highly commended for the energy, foresight, and imagination which he has applied to the solution of one of the most pressing problems of Alaska; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Honorable Richard E. McArdle, Chief, Forest Service, Department of Agriculture; the Honorable Edward P. Cliff, Assistant Chief, Forest Service, for National Forest Resource Management; the Honorable Clarence F. Pautzke, Commissioner, Fish and Wildlife, Department of the Interior; and to the members of the Alaska delegation in Congress.

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 49

Relating to the late Lawrence A. Moore.

Be It Resolved by the Senate in Second

Legislature, Second Session Assembled:

WHEREAS death has removed from the

state a distinguished citizen, the Honorable Lawrence A. Moore; and

WHEREAS Mr. Moore's early association with Alaska was as an assistant to the general manager of the Alaska Railroad and since 1946 as manager and legislative representative of the Alaska Chapter, Associated General Contractors; and

WHEREAS the long and effective career of Larry Moore on the behalf of his client and as a champion of independent causes in the legislative halls as a legislative representative earned him the affectionate title of "Dean of Lobbyists"; and

WHEREAS the blended elements of integrity, diligence, good humor, and generosity characterized his association with the

membership of the Legislature during his many years of service in the capital;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, that this resolution serve as an expression of the esteem and affection in which it held Lawrence "Larry" A. Moore and as a token of its sense of sorrow and loss at his passing; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to his sister, Mrs. J. L. Brownlow, and to his brothers, Frank X. Moore and Ray A. Moore, with the sincerest condolences of the Legislature for their loss.

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 50

Relating to pending Congressional legislation on equal pay for women.

Be It Resolved by the Senate in Second Legislature, Second Session Assembled:

WHEREAS Alaska, since its first year as a Territory and now as a state, has shown a continuing interest in and concern for equal rights for women; and

WHEREAS the first evidence of this interest was shown in 1913 when the first Act of the First Territorial Legislature was the extension of suffrage to women several years ahead of the national enactment of female suffrage; and

WHEREAS, in 1949, the Alaska Legislature provided that both sexes would receive equal pay for equal or comparable work; and

WHEREAS the Legislature of the State of Alaska is continuing the pioneer work

of its territorial predecessor in guaranteeing equal rights;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, that it respectfully urges the Congress to favorably consider further federal action to guarantee equal rights and opportunities for women and to act favorably this year on H.R. 3796 as it relates to equal pay for women for equal or comparable work; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be directed to the Honorable Ralph J. Rivers, author of H.R. 3796, for distribution to the members of the Select Subcommittee on Labor of the Committee on Education and Labor of the U. S. House of Representatives, and to the other members of the Alaska delegation in Congress.

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 51

Relating to protecting Unalakleet against storm damage.

Be It Resolved by the Senate in Second Legislature, Second Session Assembled:

WHEREAS a Federal Aviation Agency station and airfield, Bureau of Indian Affairs buildings, and a federal post office are all located at Unalakleet; and

WHEREAS Unalakleet is located on a narrow sand spit, susceptible to severe damage from storms; and

WHEREAS, in September 1960, a strong storm damaged federal installations and private property there, undermined the river bank, caused houses to tumble into the river, flooded the town, and damaged
