

Senate Resolutions

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 1

Relating to a village-connecting road program in Northwestern Alaska.

Be It Resolved by the Senate:

WHEREAS the Bureau of Indian Affairs has a road-building program intended to improve conditions in and communication between the villages of Western Alaska; and

WHEREAS this program is essential to these otherwise isolated village communities if they are to survive and develop; and

WHEREAS connecting roads will greatly assist in reducing living costs by making possible the transportation of food and other essentials from one point to another by the least expensive means; and

WHEREAS a connecting road link between Council and Kaltag and inter-

mediate villages in Northwestern Alaska should be a matter of priority in accomplishing the purposes of the Bureau of Indian Affairs road program;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Bureau of Indian Affairs is requested to give priority in its road program to the construction of a substantial road system connecting Council, White Mountain, Golovin, Elim, Moses Point, Koyuk, Ungalik, Shaktolik, Unalakleet, and Kaltag; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the Honorable Philleo Nash, Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Department of the Interior; the Honorable Robert L. Bennett, Area Director, and the Honorable Robert Trier, Chief of Roads Branch, Bureau of Indian Affairs; and the members of the Alaska delegation in Congress.

Passed by the Senate February 4 1964.

CS FOR SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 2

Relating to the expansion of the BIA drinking water program.

Be it Resolved by the Senate:

WHEREAS the Bureau of Indian Affairs now has an excellent but modest program through which it provides for drinking water for Native villages; and

WHEREAS this program is of recognized importance to the health and well-being of the residents of these villages; and

WHEREAS the program is not now designed to keep pace with the need for this essential service;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Bureau of Indian Affairs is earnestly requested to immediately expand its program for drinking water for the villages of Alaska; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the Honorable Stewart L. Udall, Secretary of the Interior; the Honorable Philleo Nash, Commissioner of Indian Affairs; the Honorable Robert L. Bennett, Area Director, Bureau of Indian Affairs; and the members of the Alaska delegation in Congress.

Passed by the Senate March 13, 1963.

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 3

Relating to the local purchase of agricultural produce by military installations.

Be It Resolved by the Senate:

WHEREAS the local purchase of agricultural produce for use in military installations is a prime factor in developing a local economy and encouraging the

development of agriculture; and

WHEREAS these economic and development factors are of vital concern in Alaska where the availability of stable markets for agricultural produce is limited; and

WHEREAS the central purchasing system of the Air Force in Alaska, in effect, deprives producers of potatoes north of the Alaska Range of reasonable access to the market provided by the several military installations in their immediate area because the potatoes must be shipped south to Elmendorf Air Force Base and then back to the installations in the area in which the potatoes are produced; and

WHEREAS this system of contracting and purchasing involves unnecessary expense; and

WHEREAS local farms are equipped to deliver directly to the installations ordering weekly supplies of potatoes and thereby are able to effect a great economy to the government; and

WHEREAS time is of essence to the local producer who must order fertilizer and plan and make other arrangements for the coming season's crop;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Department of Defense is urged to revise its contracting and purchasing procedure regarding locally produced agricultural produce so as to allow for direct purchase and delivery arrangements by each installation with the local producer or to allow the central purchasing office and commissary to contract for the purchase and delivery from and by the local producer directly to the receiving installation; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the Honorable Robert S. McNamara, Secretary of Defense; the Honorable Eugene M. Zuckert; Secretary of the Air Force; the Commander, Alaskan Command; the Commander, Alaska Air Command; and the members of the Alaska delegation in Congress.

Passed by the Senate February 7, 1964.

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 6

Relating to the designation of a Prospector of the Year.

Be it Resolved by the Senate:

WHEREAS discoveries made by Alaskan prospectors have yielded mineral wealth with a present-day value of one and a half billion dollars and have led to the building of roads, railroads, towns, and cities, including the Capital City of Juneau; and

WHEREAS the prospector, through his courage, perseverance, and defiance of hardship, has become the unique symbol

of Alaskan development and romance; and

WHEREAS the recently announced discovery of a major mine in the wilderness of Northwestern Alaska proves that undiscovered mineral wealth remains to reward the diligent prospector;

BE IT RESOLVED that the members of the Senate hereby officially designate Rhinehard Berg the Prospector of the Year for 1964 in recognition of his discovery and his long devotion to the best traditions of the Alaskan prospector.

Passed by the Senate February 10, 1964.

Relating to the late Boyd Harwood of Nome.

Be it Resolved by the Senate:

WHEREAS death has taken one of

Alaska's most productive citizens, the Honorable Boyd Harwood of Nome; and
