BE IT RESOLVED that the Alaska Communication System is requested to have

its bush stations provide a monitoring schedule of at least one hour on Saturday and Sunday during the winter months; and be it

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11

Relating to the patent of United States Forest lands for the benefit and use of Alaska.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:

WHEREAS under the provisions of Section 6 of the Alaska Statehood Act (P.L. 85-508) the State of Alaska is entitled to select 400,000 acres of land from the national forests in Alaska for its own benefit and use; and

WHEREAS since its admission to the Union, none of the forest land selected by Alaska has been approved by the United States Forest Service for patent; and

WHEREAS the acquisition of the required national forest acreage is essential to the further expansion and development of new homesites and commercial areas in

many Alaskan communities;

BE IT RESOLVED that the United States Forest Service is urged to re-evaluate its policy for approving lands selected by the State, and the Alaska delegation in Congress is requested to take whatever action that is necessary to accomplish and expedite the approval sought; and be it

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15

Relating to a boat harbor for the City of Hoonah.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:

WHEREAS fishing boats in Hoonah have increased to such an extent that crowded conditions are making mooring hazardous; and

WHEREAS various boat owners will not moor their boats in Hoonah during the winter months because of the southwest

and Glacier Bay winds which do considerable boat damage; and

WHEREAS fishermen have the added expense of running their boats south in the fall and north in the spring; and

WHEREAS the lack of a small boat harbor is threatening the entire economy of the City of Hoonah; and

WHEREAS the Corps of Engineers, U.S. Army made surveys for a small boat harbor in Hoonah in January, 1951 and again in July of 1959;

BE IT RESOLVED that the United States Department of the Army, through the Corps of Engineers, is respectfully urged to construct the small boat harbor at Hoonah at the earliest possible date; and be it

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16

Commending the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare for its response to a request for an expanded program of tuberculosis treatment in Alaska.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:

WHEREAS the Legislature of the State of Alaska in 1964 passed House Joint Resolution No. 57 requesting the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare to inaugurate a large scale and long-term program of chemoprophylaxis in the areas of high incidence of tuberculosis in Alaska; and

WHEREAS the Honorable Anthony J. Celebrezze, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare has recently announced that arrangements for the development of this type of program in conjunction with

the Alaska Department of Health and Welfare are under way; and

WHEREAS the projected program of treatment and prevention of tuberculosis by the use of drugs will be appreciated by all Alaskans desiring such treatment;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of the State of Alaska commends and thanks the Secretary and Department of Health, Education and Welfare for expanding its program for the prevention and treatment of tuberculosis in Alaska; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be directed to the Honorable Lyndon B. Johnson, President of the United States; the Honorable Anthony J. Celebrezze, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare; and the members of the Alaskan delegation in Congress.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17

Requesting a feasibility study for a breakwater at St. Paul, Alaska.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:

WHEREAS the economy of St. Paul and the other Pribilof Islands is limited to the harvesting of fur seals, a limited seasonal activity; and

WHEREAS the dependence on one seasonal occupation is a hindrance to the local economy and the well-being of the island inhabitants; and

WHEREAS the existence of a breakwater at St. Paul would make possible the development of a modest fishing industry making beneficial use of the now unused fishery resource there and provide as well

an anchorage for visiting vessels and other commerce;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, is requested to program and survey the feasibility of constructing a breakwater at St. Paul, Alaska, and to include the project in its construction program at the earliest possible time; and be it
