### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

**Requesting the construction of a breakwater at Sand Point, Alaska.**

**Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:**

WHEREAS the small moorage at Sand Point must accommodate a resident fleet of over 50 vessels and during the fishing season an additional 150 vessels require mooring space; and

WHEREAS this site is also a port of call for repairs, fuel, and supplies for the many boats operating in Bristol Bay and the area of the Alaska Peninsula; and

WHEREAS halibut fishermen fishing under provisions of the Convention for the preservation of the Halibut Fishery (1937) are required to enter and clear with U.S. Customs at Sand Point; and

WHEREAS the crowded conditions at Sand Point make it necessary for many of the vessels to moor beyond the bay where they are subject to damage and have frequently been damaged by storms and the prevailing westerly winds; and

WHEREAS the construction of a breakwater at Sand Point would alleviate this threat to property, safety, and the region's economy;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Corps of Engineers, U.S. Army is requested to seek funds and proceed with the construction of the urgently needed breakwater at Sand Point; and be it

### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7

**Relating to the announced closure of the Alaska regional office of the Veterans Administration.**

**Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:**

WHEREAS the Administrator of Veterans Affairs has announced the closure of the Alaska regional office and the transfer of its functions to the Seattle, Washington, office; and

WHEREAS the services to which the veterans in Alaska are legally entitled cannot be efficiently and fairly administered from the State of Washington because of the time lapses caused by distance, the chances of interrupted mail service, the expense of long-distance communication, the lack of knowledge of the problems and conditions peculiar to Alaska, the inherent insufficiency of written communication in regard to continuing problems, and the

isolation of the beneficiaries of the veteran's programs from their advisors;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Administrator of Veterans Affairs is requested to rescind the decision to close the Alaska regional office; and be it

### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9

**Relating to the renegotiation of the Convention for High Seas Fisheries of the North Pacific Ocean.**

**Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:**

WHEREAS, the salmon resources of the State of Alaska support historic subsistence, commercial, and sports fisheries; and

WHEREAS, these fisheries are vital to the economy of the State of Alaska and the United States and to the sustenance and enjoyment of their citizens; and

WHEREAS, these fisheries are managed by the State of Alaska under domestic law and regulation to the end that the resources shall be perpetuated while yielding the maximum sustainable harvest; and

WHEREAS, the salmon resources may be managed on a sustained yield basis only

when management may select the brood stocks according to qualitative as well as quantitative standards; and

WHEREAS, such management practices are made possible by the immutable laws of nature which provide for the division of the stocks into their divers races in the territorial waters of the State of Alaska; and

WHEREAS, the State of Alaska alone has the jurisdiction over the salmon in its territorial waters, does not yield to any other government its paramount authority in this matter, and does not recognize that any other governments may diminish its special and unique obligation to all mankind to manage these salmon so that the maximum sustained yield may be harvested; and

WHEREAS, there exists between the governments of the United States, Canada,
