HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 67

Relating to Medicare and hemophiliacs.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

WHEREAS hemophiliacs have a high risk of incurring injury and complications requiring costly hospitalization and medical services; and

WHEREAS continuous replacement therapy for hemophilia is prohibitively expensive; and

WHEREAS, in the absence of such treatment, hemophilia may be considered a disabling condition with respect to many occupations; and

WHEREAS, due to the congenital and preexisting nature of hemophilia, private health insurance is unavailable to hemophiliacs; and

WHEREAS Congress has provided medical coverage for the disabled generally through the Medicare insurance program; and

WHEREAS Congress has included other particularly difficult conditions such as chronic renal disease within the definition of disability;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Alaska State Legislature that the Congress of the United States is urgently requested to amend the Social Security Act to include hemophilia as a condition within the definition of disability for purposes of coverage under parts A and B of Medicare.
