

## CHAPTER 43.

## AN ACT

(H. B. 58)

Prohibiting the trespass of any person other than an officer upon lawful business upon any lands or premises in the lawful occupation of another upon which foxes or other furbearing animals are kept in captivity for breeding purposes without first having permission from the owner or caretaker of such foxes or fur-bearing animals, and constituting such trespass a misdemeanor and providing a penalty for a violation thereof, and that written notices be posted on such lands or premises as hereinafter provided in this Act.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska

Trespass upon lands used for breeding fur-bearing animals.

Section 1. That if any person, other than an officer on lawful business, shall go or trespass upon any lands or premises in the lawful occupation of another and upon which foxes or other furbearing animals are kept in captivity in corrals, dens or pens for breeding purposes, without having first obtained the consent and permission of the owner or caretaker of such foxes or other furbearing animals, such trespasser shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not to exceed Three Hundred Dollars, (\$300.00), and shall be committed in default of the payment of the fine and costs imposed, one day for each two dollars of the fine and costs imposed.

Notices to be posted.

Section 2. That legibly printed or written notices having attached thereto, by authority, the name of the person in the lawful occupation of such lands or premises, and stating that said lands or premises are used for the propagation of foxes or other furbearing animals, and requiring all persons to forbear trespassing on said lands or premises and to depart therefrom, posted in eight conspicuous places on said lands or premises, shall be held and deemed to be sufficient prima facie evidence of notice that consent or permission to go upon said lands or premises is refused by the owner or person in lawful occupation thereof. Absence of such notice, however, shall not constitute a defense for any person who, know-

ing such lands or premises are used for the propagation of foxes or other furbearing animals, wilfully trespassed upon the same.

Section 3. Provided, that the boundary line upon Where posted. which such notices shall be posted shall not exceed three hundred feet from the outer position of the corral, and it is further provided that this shall not interfere with travel on any public road or trail.

## CHAPTER 44.

### AN ACT

(S. B. 36)

To amend Chapter 71 of the 1915 Session Laws of Alaska, entitled "An Act relating to the measure and recovery of compensation of injured employees in the mining industry of this Territory, and compensaton to designated beneficiaries where such injuries result in death, defining and regulating the liability of employers to their employees in connection with such industry, and repealing all Acts and parts of Acts in conflict with ths Act."

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Section 1. That clause B, Section 1 of Chapter 71, of the 1915 Session Laws of Alaska be amended to read Amendment  
Ch 71 S. L.  
1915. as follows:

B. In those cases where such married employee had Compensation

ren of de-  
ceased are  
under 16. children under the age of sixteen (16) years at the time of his death, his widow shall be entitled to receive in addition to the sum above specified, the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.00) for each child under the age of sixteen (16) years, or child wholly dependent upon his or her parents for support by reason of physical or mental incompetency, or unborn or posthumous child which such employee left at the time of his decease, but not to exceed in all the sum of Six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00).
