

House Joint Resolutions

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5.

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, the Senate concurring that

WHEREAS, a condition has arisen which has delayed the printing of the advance sheets of the Laws passed by the 1933 Legislature of Alaska; and

WHEREAS, the matter of printing the advance sheets and bound volumes of such laws is now in the District Court for the First Judicial Division of the Territory of Alaska for adjudication and considerable time may elapse before the said matter is adjudicated; and

WHEREAS, the people of Alaska are entitled as a matter of law to the distribution of the said advance sheets.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that a joint committee of the Finance Committee of the Senate and the Printing Committee of the House be authorized and directed to call for bids for the printing of two hundred copies of the advance sheets of each law as filed with the Secretary of the Territory and for five hundred bound volumes of all laws passed by the Legislature in 1933. All bids shall be approved by the Governor.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE TERRITORY OF ALASKA:

WHEREAS, John Erickson, a former employee of the Alaska Railroad is now an inmate of the hospital at the Pioneers' Home at Sitka, Alaska, at the expense of the Territory of Alaska, suffering from what has been diagnosed by responsible physicians as an injury to his hip, and

WHEREAS, the said John Erickson reports that while in the employ of the said Alaska Railroad as a powder man, and after igniting a fuse, he slipped on a wet rock and fell, injuring the said hip, and

WHEREAS, provisions were made under the Act of Congress approved September 7, 1916, and known as the "Federal Compensation Act" for the care of persons injured while in the employ of the Federal Government, and the said John Erickson is justly entitled to such care,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that steps be taken to have the Federal Government assume its responsibility in this connection, and the Attorney General is hereby instructed to make an investigation of the circumstances surrounding the said accident, and to take such further steps as may be found necessary to have the said Alaska Railroad provide for the care of the said John Erickson, and, if it refuses to do so, to call upon the Delegate from Alaska to secure direct action by Congress.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE TERRITORY OF ALASKA:

That the Legislature having heard with regret the report that the Honorable Anthony J. Dimond, Delegate from Alaska, is ill in the city of Washington, D. C.,

BE IT RESOLVED that the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives be and they are hereby instructed to express by telegram to the Honorable Anthony J. Dimond in the city of Washington, D. C., the unanimous regret of the Legislature at his illness and wishes for his speedy recovery.
