Address to the Joint Session of the
Seventeenth Alaska State Legislative
First Session

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The following speech was submitted for publication in the joint journal supplement.

MR. PRESIDENT, MR. SPEAKER, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, THANK YOU FOR THAT WARM RECEPTION. IT'S A PLEASURE TO SEE SO MANY OLD FRIENDS AND NEW FACES ON THE FLOOR AND IN THE GALLERY TODAY.

THIS IS THE THIRD TIME SINCE MY ELECTION TO CONGRESS IN 1973 THAT I HAVE ADDRESSED THIS BODY

WHEN I SERVED IN THE LEGISLATURE, I USED TO DREAD SPEECHES FROM THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION -- WE DIDN'T LIKE TO BE LECTURED BACK THEN AND I'M SURE YOU FEEL THE SAME WAY. SO I PROMISE THAT I'LL TRY NOT TO DO THAT TODAY.

MY APPROACH TO WORKING WITH THE LEGISLATURE HAS ALWAYS BEEN TO SIT DOWN WITH EACH OF YOU, EITHER IN JUNEAU OR IN WASHINGTON, TO DISCUSS ISSUES OF IMPORTANCE TO YOUR DISTRICTS AND OUR STATE. AND WHILE THAT "OPEN DOOR POLICY" WILL CONTINUE, I FELT THAT IT WAS TIME FOR SOMETHING NEW

MY REASONS FOR THIS NEW APPROACH ARE TWO-FOLD: ONE, I BELIEVE THAT THERE IS A MISCONCEPTION THAT MY SERVICE IN WASHINGTON HAS TAKEN ME TOO FAR FROM ALASKA AND I WANT TO DISPEL THAT MYTH.

AS YOU KNOW, I WON A CLOSE RACE IN NOVEMBER. SOME OF YOU IN THIS ROOM MAY HAVE HAD CLOSE RACES AS WELL. AND WHILE THE MARGIN OF MY VICTORY MAY HAVE BEEN A SURPRISE TO MANY, NOW THAT THE DUST HAS SETTLED, I HAVE HAD TIME TO REFLECT AND I AM CONVINCED THAT IT WAS A POSITIVE THING.

WHILE I AM PROUD THAT I HAVE BETTER THAN A 90-PERCENT VOTING RECORD IN CONGRESS, I REALIZE NOW THAT I MUST SPEND A LITTLE MORE TIME IN THE STATE, TRAVEL MORE EXTENSIVELY AND COMMUNICATE WITH MORE OF MY FELLOW ALASKANS.

BY COMING HOME MORE OFTEN, I WILL BE ABLE TO COUNTER SOME OF THE MISINFORMATION PUT FORTH BY MY CRITICS.

THOSE CRITICS HAVE TAKEN GREAT PAINS TO TURN MY HONEST DIFFERENCES WITH THEM INTO ATTACKS UPON MY CREDIBILITY AND WORK ETHIC. IF I DISAGREE WITH THEM, I AM DEPICTED AS ARROGANT OR OUT OF TOUCH. IF WE AGREE, THE STORY SHOWS UP AT THE BACK OF THE PAPER -- IF IT SHOWS UP AT ALL

BUT I AM A BIG BOY AND I HAVE BEEN CALLED A LOT OF THINGS IN MY POLITICAL CAREER. I WON'T CRY ABOUT WHAT MY CRITICS SAY AND I WILL CHANGE -- NOT WHAT I DO -- BUT RATHER -- THE PERCEPTION OF WHAT I DO.

OF COURSE, DIFFERENT VOICES ARE THE MAINSTAY OF DEMOCRACY. AND ONE OF THE CLEAR LESSONS I HAVE LEARNED FROM THE LAST ELECTION IS THAT I MUST CONTINUE TO LISTEN TO THOSE VOICES WHILE DOING A BETTER JOB OF MAKING MY VOICE HEARD ON ISSUES IMPORTANT TO ALASKA. BUT EVEN WITH THOSE LESSONS LEARNED, I BELIEVE MORE THAN EVER THAT THE VAST MAJORITY OF ALASKANS STILL SUPPORT WHAT I HAVE FOUGHT FOR IN CONGRESS DURING THE PAST 18 YEARS

MOST ALASKANS WANT THE OPPORTUNITY TO DEVELOP THEIR NATURAL RESOURCES IN AN EFFICIENT AND ENVIRONMENTALLY SOUND MANNER;

MOST ALASKANS WANT A FAIR SHARE OF THE REVENUE FROM THOSE RESOURCES RETURNED TO OUR STATE AND OUR CITIZENS;

MOST ALASKANS WANT TO MINIMIZE THE INTRUSION OF THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT INTO THEIR EVERYDAY LIVES.

MOST ALASKANS WANT TO PAY LESS IN TAXES AND REALIZE MORE RESULTS FROM THE TAXES THEY DO PAY.

THESE ARE THE GOALS I HAVE BEEN COMMITTED TO FOR THE PAST 18 YEARS AND I REMAIN DEEPLY COMMITTED TO THEM TODAY

WE ALL KNOW THAT POLITICS IS AN UNFORGIVING BUSINESS. THE PEOPLE OF ALASKA HAVE GIVEN ME A CHANCE TO PROVE THAT I AM DEDICATED TO HELPING THEM. I AM HUMBLED BY THEIR FAITH. I PROMISE THAT I WILL NOT LET THEM DOWN.

I ASK EACH OF YOU TO ALSO RE-DEDICATE YOURSELVES TO OVERCOME THE HURDLES FACING ALASKA IN THE MONTHS AND YEARS TO COME.

FOR THOSE OF YOU WHO ARE NEW TO THIS BUSINESS, I CAN ONLY OFFER SOME ADVICE TEMPERED BY EXPERIENCE: TAKE THE SHOTS FROM YOUR CRITICS AND FIGHT FOR WHAT YOU BELIEVE IN. REMEMBER WHAT ONE OF THE MOST ADMIRED POLITICIANS OF ALL TIME SAID: "IF I WERE TO TRY TO READ, MUCH LESS ANSWER, ALL THE ATTACKS MADE ON ME, THIS SHOP MIGHT AS WELL BE CLOSED FOR ANY OTHER BUSINESS." THAT POLITICIAN WAS ABRAHAM LINCOLN, WHOSE BIRTHDAY IS TOMORROW.

MY SECOND REASON FOR JOINING YOU TODAY IS TO URGE THAT WE AS ALASKANS COME TOGETHER ON IMPORTANT ISSUES THAT WILL SHAPE THE LAST FRONTIER INTO THE 21ST CENTURY. FOR MANY ALASKANS THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT IS VIEWED, AT BEST AS A NECESSARY EVIL

REGARDLESS OF THAT VIEW, THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT IS NOT GOING TO GO AWAY. OUR DIFFERENCES WITH WASHINGTON MUST BE MET WITH CANDOR AND REALISM.

THE STATE/FEDERAL RELATIONSHIP IS A DELICATE ONE AND MY JOB AS THE LONE ALASKA REPRESENTATIVE IS TO MAKE SURE THAT THE FEDERAL PART OF THAT RELATIONSHIP IS AS BENEFICIAL AS POSSIBLE. THERE ARE MANY ISSUES THAT WE DISAGREE ON:

ANWR REVENUE SHARING, OCS DEVELOPMENT AND REVENUE SHARING, FISHERIES MANAGEMENT AND WETLANDS.

GOVERNOR HICKEL HAS SAID THAT IN MANY RESPECTS ALASKA HAS BEEN POORLY TREATED BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT -- NOT OUT OF MALICE, BUT OUT OF IGNORANCE.

I AGREE WITH THE GOVERNOR THAT IN MANY CASES WE HAVE BEEN THE "THE BASTARD CHILD" OR THE "FREE ENVIRONMENTAL VOTE" FOR MANY IN CONGRESS AND NO ONE HAS FOUGHT HARDER AGAINST THAT IGNORANCE AND MISTREATMENT OF OUR STATE THAN I HAVE.

HOWEVER, IT IS IMPORTANT TO NOTE THAT NOT ALL PARTS OF THE STATE/FEDERAL RELATIONSHIP ARE BAD. WE BENEFIT TREMENDOUSLY FROM THE STRONG PRESENCE OF THE MILITARY AND THE NON-DEFENSE-RELATED FEDERAL WORKERS IN OUR STATE. THE FEDERAL CIVILIAN PAYROLL REPRESENTS A HUGE PART OF ALASKA'S CASH FLOW. AS I SPEAK TO YOU TODAY, I AM DIRECTLY ENGAGED IN EFFORTS TO PROTECT COST OF LIVING ALLOWANCES FOR THESE IMPORTANT ALASKANS.

WE ALSO BENEFIT FROM OUR RELATIONSHIP WITH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT VIA THE BY-PASS MAIL PROGRAM WHICH GUARANTEES REGULAR MAIL SERVICE TO THE REMOTEST PARTS OF ALASKA.

THE REAUTHORIZATION OF THE MAGNUSON FISHERIES ACT WAS A MAJOR ACHIEVEMENT AND, AS I PREDICTED, WAS ACHIEVED WITH THE REFORMS ALASKANS DESIRED AND THE RETENTION OF THE ALASKAN MAJORITY ON THE COUNCIL. THIS IS ANOTHER EXAMPLE OF WHERE THE STATE/FEDERAL RELATIONSHIP IS BENEFICIAL TO OUR STATE.

WHEN WE DEAL WITH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, WE MUST REMEMBER THAT OUR RELATIONSHIP WITH WASHINGTON IS BOTH BURDENSOME AND BENEFICIAL. WHEN WE DISCUSS OUR GOALS FOR THE FUTURE, LET'S REMEMBER TO TALK ABOUT WHAT WE CAN DO RATHER THAN STRESSING OUR DIFFERENCES.

WE MUST MAKE SURE, TO THE BEST OF OUR ABILITIES, THAT ALASKAN PROBLEMS ARE ANSWERED WITH ALASKAN SOLUTIONS.

WE MUST FIGHT WHEN WE KNOW WE ARE RIGHT. WE MUST MEET ACROSS THE BARGAINING TABLE WHEN IT IS IN OUR LONG-TERM BEST INTERESTS.

TO ACHIEVE THIS GOAL, THE MOST IMPORTANT MESSAGE YOU CAN SEND TO WASHINGTON IS ONE OF UNITY. I AM PREPARED TO LISTEN TO YOU AND WORK WITH YOU TO DELIVER THAT MESSAGE.

ALASKA CANNOT REST ITS HOPES FOR THE FUTURE ON A FRACTURED FOUNDATION. WE, AS A TEAM, MUST BE STRONG AND CONFIDENT IN OUR GOALS.

HISTORY HAS TAUGHT US THAT WHEN WE ARE NOT ON THE SAME PAGE, NOBODY GETS THE MESSAGE. IT'S TOUGH ENOUGH TO PASS LEGISLATION IN WASHINGTON WHEN ALASKANS AGREE. IT IS ALMOST IMPOSSIBLE WHEN ALASKANS DISAGREE

THE HISTORY OF ANWR IS A PERFECT EXAMPLE. IN THE PAST, WE DID NOT SEND ONE MESSAGE TO CONGRESS ON ANWR. OFTEN THE STATE AND THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION DISAGREED ON SEVERAL IMPORTANT ISSUES.

WITH WALLY HICKEL AS GOVERNOR AND THIS LEGISLATURE, I AM CONFIDENT WE CAN SEND A STRONG MESSAGE OF UNITY AND DEDICATION TO WASHINGTON. I REALIZE THERE WILL BE DIFFERENCES, BUT I URGE YOU TO AIR THEM, DEBATE THEM, AND FINALLY REACH A CONSENSUS.

THE TEAM WE BUILD OVER THE NEXT TWO YEARS CAN BE VITALLY EFFECTIVE FOR THE 49TH STATE. I AM CONVINCED THAT WE CAN ALL PULL TOGETHER TO MAKE SURE THAT ALASKA'S LEGISLATIVE AGENDA IS TRIUMPHANT.

WHILE YOU ARE BUSY HERE IN JUNEAU, I WILL BE IN WASHINGTON WORKING TO BUILD ANOTHER TEAM. A TEAM OF MY COLLEAGUES FROM ACROSS AMERICA WHO WILL HELP US, NOT ONLY IN THE PRUDENT DEVELOPMENT OF ANWR AND OUR OTHER NATURAL RESOURCES, BUT ALSO ON MANY OTHER IMPORTANT ISSUES AFFECTING OUR STATE SUCH AS REDUCING OUR FEDERAL DEFICIT; PROVIDING HEALTH AND BENEFIT PROTECTIONS FOR OUR SENIORS AND VETERANS; DELIVERING ADEQUATE HOUSING FOR NATIVE ALASKANS AND SUPPORTING OUR BRAVE MEN AND WOMEN PARTICIPATING IN OPERATION DESERT STORM.

THIS NEW CONGRESS HAS SEEN SOME CHANGES. CRITICALLY IMPORTANT TO ALASKA IS THE ELEVATION OF GEORGE MILLER OF CALIFORNIA TO ACTING CHAIRMAN OF THE HOUSE INTERIOR COMMITTEE

WITH MO UDALL GRAVELY ILL, GEORGE WILL ASSUME MOST OF HIS DUTIES. GEORGE AND I HAVE A GOOD WORKING RELATIONSHIP. WE HAVE FOUGHT HARD ON MANY ISSUES AND FRANKLY DISAGREE ON MANY, BUT OUR RELATIONSHIP IS FRIENDLY AND BUSINESS-LIKE. WE RESPECT EACH OTHER AND CAN WORK TOGETHER.

I MET WITH GEORGE JUST LAST WEEK TO DISCUSS OUR GOALS FOR THIS NEXT SESSION OF CONGRESS. WE HAD A PRODUCTIVE MEETING AND I AM READY TO WORK WITH HIM, AS MUCH AS POSSIBLE, TO DRAFT BI-PARTISAN LEGISLATION ON ISSUES AFFECTING ALASKA.

ONE ISSUE THAT I HOPE WE DO NOT DEAL WITH AGAIN IS MANAGEMENT OF THE TONGASS NATIONAL FOREST. AFTER A LONG BITTER FIGHT, THAT ISSUE WAS HOPEFULLY LAID TO REST LAST SESSION. WHEN THE FINAL VOTES WERE CAST I ASKED FOR A PROMISE FROM MY COLLEAGUES THAT THIS ISSUE WOULD BE CLOSED FOR GOOD. I RECEIVED ASSURANCES BUT I WILL BE WATCHING.

IT IS IMPORTANT TO STRESS THAT KEEPING WATCH IS A CRUCIAL PART OF MY JOB IN CONGRESS. I AM ONLY ONE VOICE IN A CHORUS OF 435 BUT THROUGH SENIORITY AND HARD WORK, ALASKA'S VOICE IS HEARD WHEN REPRESENTATIVES FROM OTHER STATES GET THE URGE TO LEGISLATE OUR FUTURE

PREVENTING OTHER LAWMAKERS FROM MEDDLING IN OUR AFFAIRS IS IMPORTANT. ALTHOUGH I HAVE HAD MY SHARE OF LEGISLATION PASSED AND SIGNED INTO LAW, IT IS THE SMALL UNSEEN VICTORIES THAT I ENJOY THE MOST

I WOULD BE REMISS IN TALKING ABOUT TEAMWORK WITHOUT SINGLING OUT A FEW VALUABLE PLAYERS CERTAINLY SENATORS STEVENS AND MURKOWSKI CONTINUE TO BE ALL-STARS

BOTH MEN HAVE MADE OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTIONS TO OUR STATE AND DESERVE OUR SUPPORT. I AM PROUD TO SERVE WITH EACH OF THEM.

IT IS ALSO GOOD TO WELCOME BACK TWO VETERANS. GOVERNOR HICKEL AND LT GOVERNOR COGHILL WILL MAKE THE NEXT FOUR YEARS LIVELY -- TO SAY THE LEAST. I BELIEVE THEY WILL FIGHT WHEN IT'S OUR ONLY OPTION AND NEGOTIATE WHEN ALASKA CAN CUT A GOOD DEAL

THEY HAVE ALREADY COME FORWARD WITH SOME UNIQUE IDEAS IN SOLVING THE STATE/FEDERAL REVENUE SPLIT OF ANWR DEVELOPMENT AND I AM CONFIDENT THEY WILL CONTINUE TO PROVIDE DYNAMIC, INNOVATIVE AND RESPONSIVE LEADERSHIP.

NO DISCUSSION OF TEAM CAN BE COMPLETE WITHOUT REFERENCE TO OUR BRAVE MEN AND WOMEN IN THE PERSIAN GULF

THEY ARE FIGHTING FOR THE MOST HONEST CAUSE ANY AMERICAN CAN TAKE INTO BATTLE: FREEDOM.

ON JANUARY 12TH, I VOTED TO SUPPORT THE PRESIDENT AND THE UNITED NATIONS IN THEIR APPROACH TO SADDAM HUSSEIN'S AGGRESSION. I AM PROUD OF THAT VOTE. I HAVE ALWAYS SUPPORTED DEFENSE SPENDING THAT HAS PUT THE VERY BEST WEAPONS IN THE HANDS OF OUR TROOPS IN THE PERSIAN GULF.

BY BOMBING INNOCENT CIVILIANS COMMITTING CRIMES AGAINST OUR P.O.W.'S AND CREATING THE WORST FORM OF ENVIRONMENTAL TERRORISM, SADDAM HAS SHOWN HIS TRUE COLORS

YOU KNOW, POLITICIANS CAN MAKE MANY SPEECHES ABOUT WAR, BUT THE BEST EXPRESSION OF AMERICAN PATRIOTISM COMES FROM THE TROOPS THEMSELVES.

LET ME READ YOU A LETTER I RECEIVED FROM AN ALASKAN BOMBER PILOT JUST PRIOR TO THE OUTBREAK OF WAR.

THE WORDS OF THIS PILOT CLEARLY SHOW THAT THIS IS NOT A FIGHT FOR OIL, IT IS A FIGHT FOR FREEDOM.

THIS BATTLE DOES, HOWEVER, HOLD A MORE SUBTLE MESSAGE: WHEN AMERICA DEPENDS ON OTHERS FOR RESOURCES, WE EXPOSE OURSELVES TO DANGER AND INSTABILITY. IT DOESN'T MATTER WHETHER THE RESOURCES COME FROM THE PERSIAN GULF, MEXICO OR THE NORTH SEA.

TO MAKE SURE THAT WE HAVE TOTAL ACCESS TO THE RESOURCES WE NEED, WE MUST CONTROL THOSE RESOURCES. THE 1973 OPEC OIL EMBARGO WAS A WARNING. THE CONFLICT IN THE PERSIAN GULF IS A WARNING. HOW MANY MORE WARNINGS DO WE NEED?

THIS IS NOT TO SAY THAT OIL IS THE ONLY ANSWER. I STAND WITH OTHERS THAT FEEL AMERICA MUST ADOPT A NATIONAL ENERGY POLICY. A POLICY THAT DEVELOPS CONVENTIONAL AND ALTERNATIVE FORMS OF ENERGY.

WE MAY WISH TO END OUR RELIANCE ON PETROLEUM, BUT THAT WILL NOT COME OVERNIGHT. CONSERVATION WILL HELP BUT IT IS NAIVE TO THINK THAT CONSERVATION ALONE WILL SOLVE OUR PROBLEM. WE MUST PURSUE OUR ENERGY GOALS ON A DOUBLE-TRACK:

WE MUST CONTINUE TO TAP DOMESTIC OIL RESOURCES.

WE MUST EXPLORE THE VARIETY OF OTHER FUELS THAT AMERICA NEEDS TO MOVE FORWARD

IN ALASKA, WE MUST DEVELOP ANWR.

WE MUST DEVELOP OUR COAL.

WE MUST DEVELOP OUR HYDRO.

WE MUST DEVELOP OUR GAS.

WE MUST DEVELOP OUR OFF-SHORE AREAS WHERE ENVIRONMENTALLY SAFE.

WE MUST DEVELOP OUR RESOURCES FOR ALASKA AS WELL AS FOR THE NATION.

WE MUST AS ALASKANS WORK TOGETHER.

THANK YOU.

DEAR CONGRESSMAN YOUNG:

I AM AN ACTIVE DUTY AIR FORCE OFFICER AND A FELLOW ALASKAN. AS A CONCERNED CITIZEN, I'M WRITING TO EXPRESS MY OPINION ON THE CURRENT SITUATION IN THE PERSIAN GULF.

I SUPPORT PRESIDENT BUSH'S EFFORTS TO BRING TOGETHER AN INTERNATIONAL COALITION OPPOSING SADAAM HUSSEIN'S IRAQ. HOPEFULLY, THE SIZE OF THE FORCE WILL BE ENOUGH TO SCARE THE WITS OUT OF THE IRAQI DICTATOR. THIS MADMAN IS A MENACE, BUT HE WILL BE MORE THAN JUST A MENACE IF HE IS ALLOWED TO CONTINUE IN POWER. IMAGINE HIM IN POSSESSION OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS AND ICBMs. THE REALITY IS SCARY ENOUGH ALREADY.

I DON'T BELIEVE OUR TROOPS SHOULD SIT IN SAUDI ARABIA WAITING FOR SOMETHING TO HAPPEN. THE WORLD, INCLUDING THE ARABS, WILL THANK US FOR RIDDING THEM OF SADDAM HUSSEIN. ONCE WE HAVE A FORCE OF SUFFICIENT SIZE IN PLACE, WE SHOULD GO ON THE OFFENSIVE. THERE WILL BE

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AWFUL CASUALTIES, BUT FAR FEWER THAN IF WE DO NOTHING, OR IF WE JUST "HOLD THE LINE" IN SAUDI ARABIA FOR SEVERAL YEARS. THE ANALOGY TO HITLER IS NOT FAR-FETCHED, AND IT TOOK 50 MILLION LIVES TO FINALLY STOP HIM. MUST WE WAIT UNTIL THEN?

MY UNIT IS THERE FOR THE DURATION. ONCE A SUFFICIENT FORCE IS IN PLACE, I SUPPORT A DECLARATION OF WAR AGAINST IRAQ. HIT FAST, HIT HARD, AND STRIKE FOR THE HEART -- BAGHDAD, NOT KUWAIT.

TO PARAPHRASE CHURCHILL, WAR IS A TERRIBLE THING, BUT NOT AS TERRIBLE AS STANDING BY IDLY AND WATCHING THIS BULLY RAPE AND PILLAGE AN ENTIRE COUNTRY, HOLDING OUR CITIZENS HOSTAGE EVERY DAY WE DO NOTHING IS A DAY SADDAM HUSSEIN LEARNS HE CAN SPIT ON THE MOST BASIC HUMAN RIGHTS AND GET AWAY WITH IT
